MOSTLY FINE—A FEW SHOWERS.

Toronto, June 13.—11 p.m.—The pressure is below the average throughout the Dominion, the lowest being over Eastern Ontario. The weather today has been cooler in the northern portion of the lake region and along the St. Lawrence. Light showers have occurred in many parts of Ontario, and heavy showers in Quebec.

Minimum and maximum temperatures reported for today are as follows: Edmonton, 44—62; Calgary, 36—65; Prince Albert, 38—74; Winnipeg, 44—74; Pelly Sound, 54—66; Toronto, 62—81; Montreal, 64—78; Quebec, 58—76; Chatham, 54—83; Halifax, 50—74.
Toronto, June 14.—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region, covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville, are: Moderate winds; mostly fine weather with showers at a few points in Northern and Western Ontario.

The bonds are being floated by a London syndicate at 94 cents on the dollar.

AFTER "DIAMOND CHARLIE."

Mr. Grover B. Simpson, special detective of the Wells-Fargo Express Company, and Mr. Joseph P. Johnston, postoffice inspector, of St. Louis, Mo., arrived in Toronto yesterday with the extradition papers for Hutton, alias Rothschild, alias "Diamond Charlie," who was arrested in St. Marys while attempting some daring robberies. Everything is now in readiness for the extradition proceedings before Judge McDougall. This is the man who unsuccessfully attempted to swindle a London jeweler last winter.

CALL TO REV. D. M. MIHELL.

The St. George correspondent of the Brantford Expositor says: "At a well-attended meeting of the members of the Baptist Church on Sunday morning, after the services, a cordial and unanimous call was extended to the Rev. D. M. Mihell, M.A., Th.B., of London, to become their pastor. A committee, consisting of Mr. S. Atmore and Mr. G. Patton, was appointed to wait on him and acquaint him with the result of their deliberations. We understand that he has asked for a couple of weeks to consider the matter. Mr. Mihell was pastor of this church for five years immediately after leaving college, and now, after ten years' absence to receive a unanimous call to return, speaks well for church and minister."

BEST MANAGERS OF ESTATES.

One of the outgrowths of modern civilization has been the establishment of "trusts companies," specially formed to act as executors and trustees for estates, so as to afford absolute security at the least possible expense. This company has as its president, Hon. Edward Blake, while its managing director is Mr. J. W. Langmuir. Among its directors is Mr. George A. Cox, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce; Senator Smith, and other well-known money men. Ever since its formation, thirteen years ago, its operations have steadily extended, and last year it earned a profit of \$52,575.21, after providing for every liability.

It paid 10 per cent on its capital stock, and added to its reserve funds, now nearly \$300,000, by \$19,000. Since its formation, estates passed through its hands valued at \$15,000,000, and after their winding up and the distribution of large sums involved, over \$10,000,000 still remain under the care of the company. This proves that the public has confidence in its standing and in the service at a minimum of cost. The
