Apples, Eggs, Cheese, Peas and Hay. The Figures Demanded - Exaggera

THE APPLE CROP. We are now in a position to give a better idea of the apple crop of Ontario, our information being derived from parties who have made special trips through the apple sections of On-tario, for the purpose of ascertaining, for the English houses they represent. the condition of the crop at the present time. And, as the report given us by different parties agree in the main, we publish them with greater confidence as affording a pretty accurate idea of the yield as promised at this time. In the majority of the orchards west of Toronto, as far as St. Catharines, the prospects favor a good crop Greenings and Northern Spies, the ruit having a clean and fine appearance; but red fruit, such as Baldwins, re a comparative failure, and all gree in stating that this is an off year Baldwins. West of St. Catharines, moderately good crop of Greenings promised, and a fair yield of Spies with a good sprinkling of Russets. There is the same paucity of red apples in these sections as noticed between St. Catharines and Hamilton, and in sections north and northwest of Toronto. East of Toronto, as far as Brockville, here will be a fair crop of green fruit, and in some orchards a good sprinkling of red fruit is observable. Of ourse, these conditions may be subject to modification by the havoc of wind storms; but the results from present appearances may be calculated
