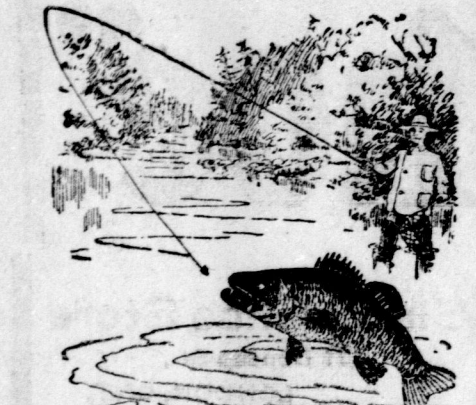

GETS AFTER TENDERS

**No. 3 Committee Won't Be Caught
Without Fuel Again.**

**The Tenants of Market Spaces Must
Pay Up.**

Profiting by the experience gained
last year, No. 3 committee has decided
not to leave the calling for tenders
this year until a late date. They will
be asked for immediately, both for coal
and wood. The committee believes that
the price of coal will not go lower than
it is now.

The butchers occupying space in the
pavilion built for them on the market
will be liable to have their stock seized
if they are not prompt in the payment
of their rentals. Many of them have
been very careless in this respect and
the committee decided that this step
would be taken if they are not more
prompt. A motion directing the clerk
to enforce the resolution was adopted.
In view of the fact that repairs are
contemplated at the market house it
was thought wise to have a lease in
which the rent mentioned would be an
advance to each tenant. If it is not
signed by a majority of the people
the tenants the repairs will not be gone
on with and in the event of their being
sufficiently signed the minority will
have to vacate the premises. The city's
object in increasing the rent is to ob-
tain enough money to cover the re-
pairs.

Inspector McCallum reported that he
had collected \$480 in licenses up to the
present time, \$675 in statute labor tax
and \$735 in dog taxes.

Fireman Riddle, of the central sta-
tion, applied for an increase in salary
on account of the extra work of doing
electrician's duty at the hall. The re-
quest was laid over.

At the regular meeting last night were Chairman Green-
leaves, Ald. Matthews and Saunders, Sec-
retary Bell, Inspector McCallum and
Market Clerk Maker.

HOWELLS ARE HERE YET

**City Will Be Rid of Them Before
Week's End, However.**

**Charge Against William Coyne Was
Withdrawn—Police Court.**

The police say that the city will be
rid of the notorious Howell family by
the end of this week. The magistrate,
on instructing them to leave the city,
gave them a week's grace in which to
gather together their personal effects,
and their case was enlarged for a week
in court this morning. They have
been a source of much trouble to both
the city and county police, who are
congratulating themselves upon their
prospective removal.

William Coyne was charged with
abusive language by Eureka Jacoby.
She later withdrew the charge and
Coyne was allowed to go on payment
of his first fine.

Several minor cases were disposed of.

The Woman's Morning Music Club
is approaching the end of its seventh
season. Only one more recital will be
given, Franz Abt's cantata, "The Wish-

good music, its educating influ-
ence, and its development of
talent cannot be measured; but the

WAR AGAINST THE CIGARETTE

**Mr. Bickerdyke Proposes a
Prohibitive Measure.**

BUDGET DEBATE STILL GOES ON

**Alaska Boundary Question Brought
Up in the Senate—Mr. Sifton's
Mission.**

Ottawa, April 29.—The budget debate
was resumed in the House by Mr.
Hackett (West Prince Edward Island),
who said that owing to the rise in the
price of commodities the ad valorem
duties of the Liberal tariff were giving
higher protection than did the specific
duties of the Conservative tariff.

Mr. Schell (Glenarry) showed that
by no means all the manufacturers
were asking the Government for in-
creased protection. Most of them were
well satisfied with the present tariff.
The farmers were in a better position
than they had ever been. If the far-
mers were going to be taxed 50 or 100
per cent, let them know that the fight is
on, and there will be an overwhelming
majority returned to Parliament
in opposition to increased protection.

Mr. Morin (Dorchester) said Sir Wil-
frid Laurier had promised the people
of Quebec that he would reduce the
price of coal oil, reduce the price of
farm implements and reduce the pub-
lic debt. He had reduced nothing.

Mr. Ross (South Ontario) defended
the Government's policy. He also
urged the importance of instituting a
scheme of free rural mail delivery. In
connection with the Intercolonial Rail-
way, he said that the extension of the
line to Montreal had been justified,
and thought that the line should be
further extended into the west, all
other roads that desired being given
running rights over it. There were
some inequalities in the tariff which
the Government would remedy, but the
present tariff had made for the pro-
gress and prosperity of the country.

Mr. Kempf (East Toronto) said the
Government had been trifling and
dilatory in the early stages of the
German discrimination against Cana-
da. He endorsed the surtax, but
blamed the Government for its course
in regard to Mr. Chamberlain's pro-
posals for co-operation in imperial de-
fence.

Mr. Gallier (Yale and Carleton) wanted increased protection for the
lead industry and tobacco raising in-
dustry of British Columbia.

Mr. Henderson (Halt) had no use
for local protectionists, who simply
wanted protection on interests in their
own constituencies, while they were
not willing to afford the same protec-
tion to all the industries of the coun-
try.

AGAINST CIGARETTES

Mr. Bickerdyke introduced his bill
to "prohibit the importation, manufac-
ture or sale of cigarettes, and it was
given its first reading.

In reply to Mr. Taylor, the Premier
said the resolution in regard to this
matter which passed the House was
not a unanimous one. Many members
had voted against it, and the Govern-
ment did not accept it as a mandate,
particularly as it was announced at
the time that this was a matter of
policy which the Government had not
yet considered.

THE SENATE.

In the Senate this afternoon, in
answer to Hon. Mr. Perley, Hon. R.
W. Scott said there was a settlement
of the Manitoba school question made
in 1897 and ratified by the Manitoba
deputation. The terms allowed of re-
ligious instructions being given during
certain hours, for the appointment of
school trustees, if required, and the
employment of Catholic teachers and
the use of other languages than Eng-
lish. The settlement had been acquies-
ced in outside of Winnipeg. There
the majority refused to allow the mi-
nority's rights, and the Catholics
supported their own schools and paid
for them. The Manitoba school board
had been entered on to alter this.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed moved the sec-
ond reading of the bill to amend the
criminal code, respecting offences con-
nected with trade and breaches of
contract. He said the cause of the
bill was to be found in certain abuses
which had been found in the labor
world, particularly in the West. He
referred to the presence of the alien
labor agitators who stirred up strife.

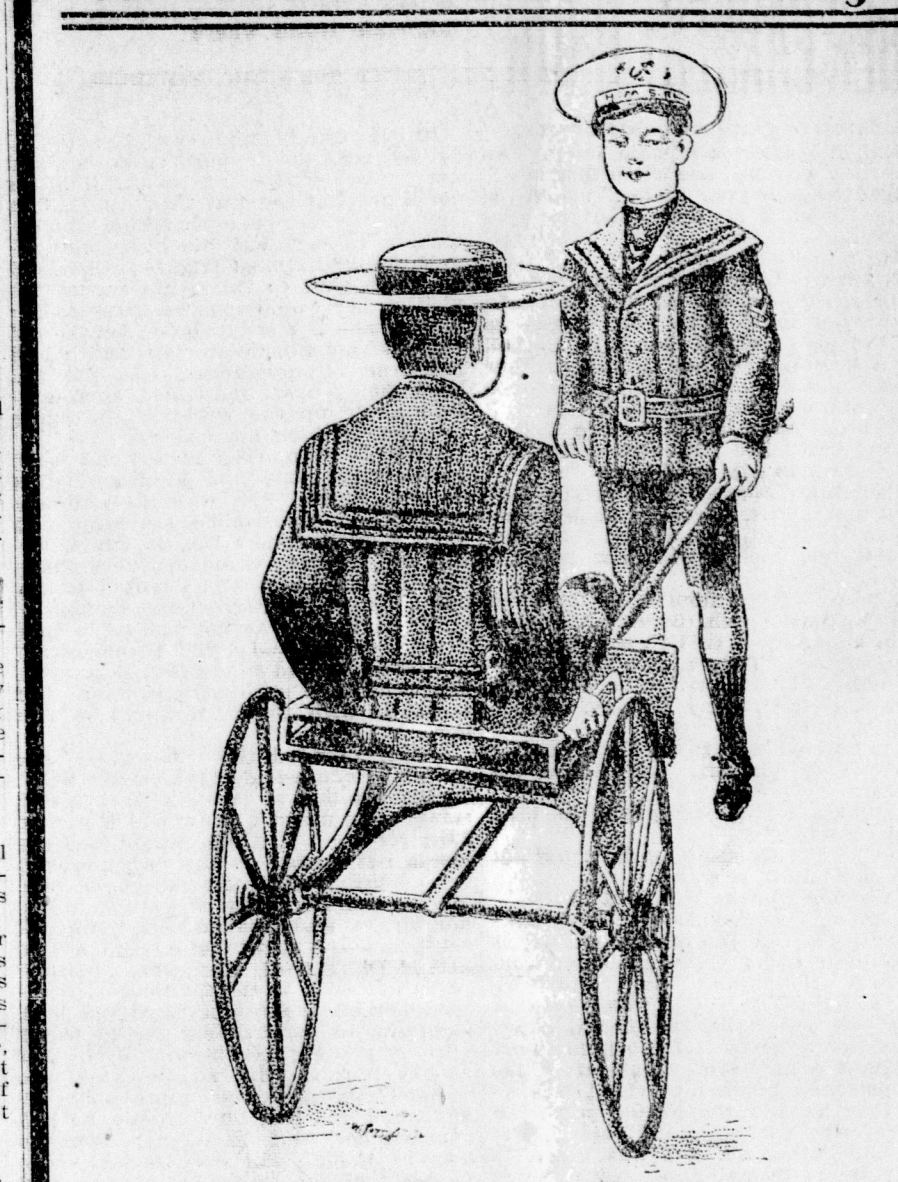
