TWO GATHERINGS OF ODDFELLOWS

Grand Encampment of Ontario Meets in Hamilton.

DAUGHTERS OF REBEKAH BUSY

Londoners Re-Elected Officers—The Growth of the Order in Ontario—Encouraging Reports.

Hamilton, Aug. 11.—This is Oddfellows' week in Hamilton. This morning the Grand Encampment of Ontario began its annual session, and the annual session of the Grand Assembly of Ontario was opened at the same time, in the same building, the courthouse. Tomorrow the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Oddfellows will assemble in the courthouse, and the Daughters will continue in session tomorrow.

The Grand Encampment concluded its business this afternoon. E. J. Spackman, grand patriarch, formally presided. Mayor Morden formally welcomed the encampment delegates, and his words of welcome were responded to by Grand Patriarch Spackman. The Hamilton Encampment greeted the visitors through George F. McQueen, D. D. G. P., representing Hamilton District No. 7. The grand patriarch replied.

Reports were presented this forenoon, and they were regarded as satisfactory. The grand patriarch said it was with genuine pleasure that he was able to report a gain in membership in the encampment work. He gave the patriarch credit for rapid progress made by the subordinate lodges. In connection with his official duties during the year, the grand patriarch referred to his Hamilton visit. He made special reference to the fact that the grand patriarch had been in Hamilton for 30 years, so far as the work of 30 years in encampment work. G. F. Abner Fraser and D. D. G. P. George F. McQueen, as old and faithful patriarchs, the grand patriarch made feeling reference to the death of S. S. Merrick, Carleton Place, a past grand patriarch.

The grand patriarch's report stated that, while there were fewer I. O. O. F. lodges joining the encampments today than 20 years ago, so far as the work of 20 years in encampment work, the order was concerned, there was a larger proportion in Ontario. The growth in this province had been greater than throughout the remainder of the jurisdictions. The long-talked-of Oddfellows' home had been purchased at Oakville where a two-story brick house and a 50-acre farm had been acquired by the order at a cost of \$7,500. J. A. Young, P. G. M., had been appointed superintendent, and Mrs. Young matron at a salary of \$500 a year.

The grand treasurer's report showed \$1,710.84 receipts, and a balance on hand amounting to \$159.41. The usual committee were appointed.

OFFICERS CHOSEN.
The various committees reported this afternoon, and the reports were read. The following officers of the Grand Encampment were chosen: Grand patriarch, L. B. Cooper, Belleville; grand high priest, E. C. Garbutt, Toronto; grand secretary, G. C. Mortimer, Toronto; grand treasurer, M. D. Dawson, London; grand recorder, Edmund Beltz, London; grand chaplain, Wm. Robertson, Wingham; grand marshal, H. Rath, Brockville; grand inside sentinel, John Fanning, Peterborough; grand outside sentinel, William Robertson, Wingham; grand scribe, Dawson, of London and Past Grand Patriarch A. H. Blackie, of Kingston, were named as representatives from the Grand Encampment to the board of directors of the Oddfellows' Home. An invitation from London to hold the next encampment there was respectfully declined, because it was felt that it would be better for the encampment to be held at the same time and place as the grand lodge. The mileage and per diem committee recommended that representatives be paid mileage at the rate of 50 cents a mile one way and \$2 per diem, and this carried. The institution of the new officers by the retiring grand patriarch was concluded. Tonight the delegates had a banquet at the Hamilton Hotel. The prime object of the Oriental Order of Humility and Perfection.

DAUGHTERS OF REBEKAH.

Young, Thamesford; treasurer, Mrs. Nellie Dodson, Chatham. Tonight the Rebekah delegates were conferred by a Dundas team. The reports presented were all encouraging.

TURBULENCE AT KIEFF

Shooting Going On Daily Throughout the City.

London, Aug. 12.—The Sturtevant Engineering Company, of this city, has received a letter from an agent at Kieff, dated Aug. 8, saying that the state of siege owing to the labor troubles continuing, the men will not work and will not allow machinery that is ready to be set up to be removed from the engineering works.

Work of every kind has stopped. The strikers have even forced girls to leave dress-making and shoe shops under threats of death. The streets are filled with cavalry and foot soldiers. Shooting is going on daily. The waterworks are operated by soldiers. All freight traffic on the railways has been stopped, and passenger trains are run with difficulty. The tram cars have stopped running. The outlook for business is very black, notwithstanding a splendid harvest.

A CLOSE SHAVE

A Big Atlantic Liner Misses Collision by Hairsbreadth.

New York, Aug. 12.—Yesterday afternoon the Hamburg-American Line steamer Nubia from China and Japan passed the Kronprinz Wilhelm, which was with the great trans-Atlantic liner Kronprinz Wilhelm. The Nubia was feeling her way through the fog. Captain Von Hoff estimated that he was about eight miles east of Sandy Hook, and that the Kronprinz Wilhelm was about eight miles west of Sandy Hook. The Nubia had anchored and had barely changed her steam whistle for signals to those of the Kronprinz Wilhelm, when the two ships were in the fog, blowing hoarse blasts and a collision was imminent. Almost instantly the approaching stranger appeared to see the Nubia, gave a sharp cheer to port and passed close under the stern of the Kronprinz Wilhelm. The passing craft was the Kronprinz Wilhelm going at full speed outward bound from New York for Bremen.
