FATAL EXPLOSION ON GOVT. BOAT

Acetylene Gas Causes Death of Mate of the Scout—Four of Crew Missing.

Kington, Ont., April 18.—Shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon a terrific explosion was heard all over the city. In the Government boat Scout acetylene gas was being generated to fill immense buoys ten feet in diameter used as buoyancy. The gas in one of the buoys exploded, and huge pieces weighing hundreds of pounds were hurled into the air. In a moment the boat was a mass of flames.

One man, Fred Mullin, of Welland county, was hurled 75 feet and his head blown off. Capt. Allison, of Morrisburg, was terribly burned, and parts of his body mutilated. He is liable to die. Others were injured. Four are still missing, and it is feared they are in the debris of the vessel.

The city was thrown into a state of great excitement, and crowds rushed to the water front. They were hurried to see flames bursting from the Government steamer Scout that was

moored to the end of the dock. Three of the crew managed to make their way from the burning boat soon after the explosion. Mr. Clifford Tessier, of Cornwall, who was thrown into the water, was picked up badly burned. The cause of the accident is not known definitely.

Capt. Allison is too ill to say anything about it. All that the crew say is that in filling a buoy with the acetylene gas, which is burned all summer, it exploded, the pressure sending a big hole in the buoy. The dry dock shed in one part was shattered by flying debris. The boat was soon a mass of flames, and though the firemen worked faithfully, her upper works were destroyed and her hull was thoroughly gutted.

Two years ago the Scout was lengthened in Davis' dry dock, the work occupying about four months. Twenty feet was added to her. The work cost \$20,000. The steamer was valued at about \$40,000. There were about twenty physicians on the scene of the accident within a few minutes of its occurrence. They rendered every assistance possible in aiding the injured, relieving them temporarily and sending them off to the hospital with dispatch in the ambulances.

All the windows in houses and factories in the vicinity of the dry docks were smashed, and the force of the explosion caused damage to property within a radius of many hundred yards. The explosion was heard in Cape Vincent, N. Y.

Her story was somewhat lengthy, she giving an account of his neglect. She had been sick for some time, and her sickness being superinduced by his neglect. He would not come home for meals, and during her sickness left her to look out for herself. It was only by luck that she managed to live. During their married life he had not given her any more than \$5 for clothes. McFarlane denied the whole thing. The magistrate found him guilty and remanded him until Saturday for sentence.

STOESSEL COULD HAVE HELD OUT

Correspondent Bartlett Believes He Surrendered Four Months Too Soon.

The illustrated lecture delivered in the Auditorium last evening by Ellis Ashmead Bartlett, correspondent for the London Times in the Russo-Jap war, was one of the best entertainments given to Londoners this season. It consisted of the showing by lime-light of 134 photographs taken by Mr. Bartlett during the siege and after the fall of Port Arthur, with a few words of explanation added to each. The pictures being very good ones and shown in chronological order, no better method of bringing home the circumstances surrounding this remarkable siege to the minds of the audience could have been adopted. The audience was a very large one, and gave the closest attention to the lecture. Mr. Bartlett was, of course, with the Japanese army, and his pictures and descriptions were calculated to stir his hearers with great admiration for that sturdy little nation.

The first photo was a large and life-like one of Admiral Togo, taken on the battle ship, the Mikasa. Mr. Bartlett was wearing a broad smile on his face, the reason for which, the speaker explained, was that several of the war correspondents were with him. The pictures being very good ones and shown in chronological order, no better method of bringing home the circumstances surrounding this remarkable siege to the minds of the audience could have been adopted. The audience was a very large one, and gave the closest attention to the lecture. Mr. Bartlett was, of course, with the Japanese army, and his pictures and descriptions were calculated to stir his hearers with great admiration for that sturdy little nation.

"The only other time Togo was known to smile was when he heard that the Japanese were on his way out with a Russian fleet," said Mr. Bartlett. The speaker had left Togo shortly afterwards and joined the third Japanese army, under Gen. (Baron) Nogi, before Port Arthur. He had some photos of the battlefield of Nao Shan. An excellent picture was that of a regiment which had been disgraced for failing to attack when ordered on Aug. 23, and which was sent back to do recruit drill for six weeks, after which it was again permitted by Nogi to return to the front. Another photo showed a huge pile of coats and arms, which had been sent back to the rear and which the advanced trenches, just before an assault in which half of them were killed. Another fine picture showed hundreds of soldiers engaged in dragging the huge 15-ton guns, eleven of which were used to demolish the forts of Port Arthur, into position. These guns fired explosives weighing 500 pounds, each of which cost \$500, and 6,000 of these shells were dropped into Port Arthur during the siege, in addition to the 1,000 shells of a half of smaller missiles.

The speaker explained the working of the telephone system in the Japanese army before Port Arthur. Wires ran from Nogi's headquarters to each of the divisional commanders and from these in turn to the advanced trenches. Nogi, two miles to the rear, could thus move the various sections of his army like chessmen. The tinkling of the telephone bell was the signal for an assault. Reports of the terrible execution done have not been at all exaggerated. The advanced trenches of the Russians and Japanese were only 50 yards from each other. When the Japs attacked, the Russians did not retreat, but they raised their rifles and shot at the Japs. Whole companies were annihilated inside of a few minutes in these terrible assaults. Several pictures showed the sides of the Japs, and the dead bodies were packed so closely together that, as the speaker remarked, it was hard to place to pick one's way through them.

Other fine pictures showed the big guns actually firing, various famous Jap commanders at the front, and so forth. The fort where the Russians were killed by the explosion of a mine was shown. The various other Russian positions after their capture. The final photos showed the Japs' triumphant entry into Port Arthur and the great banquet which followed.

"Perhaps never has such an event happened in the world's history. Just ten years before, Nogi had entered the fortress after capturing Port Arthur. It took him six months to capture the town, and the expenditure of \$8,000,000 in killed and wounded. Now, what I saw inside the captured fort, concluded Mr. Bartlett, "I am morally certain that

NO THREAT FROM REAUME

Extension of Fishery Season in Ontario in Commons.

Ottawa, April 18.—When the House got down to business today Mr. Boyce, of West Algona, drew attention to a press dispatch from Toronto, stating that Dr. Reaume, the Ontario Commissioner of Public Works, had wired a protest to Ottawa against the action of the marine and fisheries department in extending the fishing season for a portion of Lake Erie.

The telegram alleged to have been sent by Dr. Reaume to the minister, read: "You will have to declare an extension of time for the entire Province or shall rescind every license. It is equal rights for all and special privileges to none, for me."

Mr. Boyce asked what reply had been sent and what was the policy of the department in regard to uniform regulations in view of the evident conflict of authority.

Mr. Prefontaine said that no such telegram had been received. The policy of the department was to consider all requests for extensions and decide each case upon its merits and according to the peculiar circumstances.

Mr. W. F. Maclean suggested that the Government keep its eye on the polar expedition that our interests in Cape Breton so that our interests in the Gulf of St. Lawrence might not be jeopardized. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that we had a Canadian ship in Hudson Bay already.
