CHEESE SCORING CONTEST

Result of the Competition Held in Connection With Dairy Convention.

Secretary Barr, of the Western Ontario Dairyman's Association, has announced the result of the cheese scoring contest, held in connection with the Western Ontario Dairyman's convention.

Average score of the three judges—Flavor, 41; texture, 28.50; color, 14.16; finish, 10—total, 93.66.

First prize, James Cleland, Listowel—Flavor, 41; texture, 28; color, 14.50; finish, 10—total, 93.50.

Second prize, F. A. Thompson, Bonnington—Flavor, 40; texture, 29; color, 10—total, 93.50.

The prize was awarded upon the following score of points.

One point, difference in flavor, is equal to four points.

One point, difference in texture, is equal to three points.

One point, difference in color, is equal to 1.50 points.

According to this method the scoring is based upon the relative importance of the score. Flavor was of more importance than texture, and also of more importance than color.

Although the total score of both prize winners is the same according to this method of scoring, Mr. Cleland is considerably ahead, as follows:

Difference in flavor point—1.50
Difference in texture ½ point—1.50
Difference in color 1-3 point—3.50

Total points 3.74

Mr. Garratt's Plum Was Placed in Cold Storage

Appointment to the Fair Board Held Up—Is for an Alderman Yet.

The city council last night held a session which lasted a little less than two hours, and at which a large list of routine business was transacted. Mayor Booth, Ald. Gillean, Saunders, Gerry, Booth, Rose, Matthews, Beattie, Scarlett, Stevely and Cooper and City Clerk Baker were present.

A bylaw was introduced to appoint Mr. Joshua Garratt on the Western Fair board instead of Ald. Booth, who dropped from the fair board to make way for Mr. Garratt. The latter had been appointed to the L. and P. S. R. board, but as one too many directors had been named for that body, it was found necessary to make a berth for Mr. Garratt somewhere else. So Ald. Booth made a vacancy on the fair board.

Ald. Cooper blocked the appointment, however.

"You don't even know that Mr. Garratt will be confirmed in the seat," he said. "You had better wait until you hear from the courts. And he is not yet an alderman, for he has not appeared to take the oath."

And on motion of Ald. Cooper, the bylaw was allowed to lay over.

Mr. Charles Taylor was appointed to succeed Mr. W. D. Willis on the board of health, Mr. Willis having gone west to live.

Street Watering.

The watering of the city streets by the London Street Railway Company was brought up by a motion introduced by Ald. Gillean, seconded by Ald. Booth.

No. 3 committee be given power to make a contract for street watering with the company for a term of years; and as the municipal act only allows a municipality to make a contract for one year, that the Legislature be asked to amend the act, so as to permit of the city making an agreement for a term of years.

Ald. Gillean explained that the company will not go to the expense of purchasing a sprinkler unless the city is willing to make a contract for a term of years sufficient to make it worth while.

Ald. Matthews said that no matter what is done the city will have to have the old carts. The street railway cannot do all the watering. He thought the council should wait awhile. He didn't agree to believe the water shortage is as great as indicated by the commissioners.

Ald. Cooper was of a like opinion. Ald. Booth vigorously defended the proposal. The scarcity of water warrants such a scheme being adopted, he said. Ald. Booth did not bind the city to a contract. It only gave the committee power to go ahead and negotiate with the company for an agreement which will cover a term of years.

The Isolation Hospital.

Chairman Matthews of No. 2 committee stated that he has arranged for a new isolation hospital to be constructed on the site of the old hospital.

It was also stated that when matters are sufficiently advanced, and the new hospital scheme is agreed upon, a special building committee will be set up to superintend the construction of the hospital.

The seven clauses of No. 1 committee's report were carried, including the clause which recommended that the petition of the deputy returning officers who acted in the last election, for an increase in pay, be filed.

BILL MAY EXILE RICH AMERICANS

Measure Before Congress Deprives Those Living Abroad of Citizenship.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 22.—Rich Americans who have established permanent residences in Paris and other attractive capitals of Europe, will find their citizenship endangered if a bill favorably reported to the House today by the house committee on foreign affairs be enacted into law.

The bill establishes several other principles of great importance. Any naturalized citizen residing five years in a foreign state will cease to be an American citizen. Any American woman who marries a foreigner will take the nationality of her husband, but at the termination of the marital relationship may resume American citizenship. Any foreign woman marrying an American becomes an American citizen, which she will retain, unless she formally renounces allegiance.

A child born without the United States of alien parents will be deemed a citizen by virtue of the naturalization of the parent during its minority, citizenship to begin at the time of permanent residence in the United States. Children born abroad of American citizens, who continue to reside outside of the United States must, in order to receive the protection of this Government, record at an American consulate when they reach the age of 18 years their intention to become residents and remain citizens of the United States.

SCIENCE VS. RELIGION

President Eliot, of Harvard, Says Latter Must Bow to Former.

Boston, Jan. 22.—President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard University, speaking before a meeting of Congregational ministers in this city today on the subject of Ecclesiasticalism, Ritualism and Creeds, emphasized his position against anything and everything that stands for finality in religion.

"Outside of what is called religion," he said, "there is no place where absolute truth is fixed. There is an irresistible trend toward the belief that truth cannot be fixed. In the region of philosophy and metaphysics there is an incessant flux; in chemistry, zoology, botany, no one for a moment believes that the end has been reached. Why should the theologian say he has reached the fixed point in his research?"

The speaker likened the theme of science to a mountain feeling his way carefully and slowly into a harbor overhung with fog.

"That is precisely what the men of science are doing," said President Eliot. "They know how slowly, painfully, patiently they must make their way. The theologian takes a different attitude. He sees in the fog of mystery a thing to be believed. The scientific man is going to rule. Before long it will be only his way that will command the respect of thinking people."

PETERBORO MEN APE COWBOYS

Have Strenuous Time Rounding Up Herd of Cattle With Winchester.

Peterboro, Ont., Jan. 22.—A story which savors of the wild and woolly west, comes from a section of Smith Township, known as "The Wilderness."

It relates to the rounding up of several head of wild cattle on the farm of Andrew Tully, of the third line of Smith, which almost resulted in the loss of human life. These brutes owe their fierceness to a buffalo ancestor, who was at one time used for cross-breeding in that district.

The other afternoon, three young men, Percy and James Dunlop and Nathan Stahler, armed with 44-Winchester rifles, started out in pursuit of the wild animals, which have scarcely seen a human being since their birth. They had purchased them from Tully, and it was only with dogs and guns that the animals could be caught. Percy Dunlop succeeded early in boring a hole through the head of a young heifer which could get through the woods as swift as any deer.

The animal ran a long distance before the loss of blood compelled it to drop. A couple of the hunters immediately proceeded to stick the heifer, which made several unsuccessful attempts to break away. In the midst of their work they suddenly heard a crashing of dead boughs, and two of the other infuriated cattle were almost on them. They rapidly dodged the animals, which passed between the two men as they were holding down the first prize. They were soon forced to abandon positions and seek shelter behind some stumps until able to get a shot at the enraged beasts. The hunters only got half the cattle on that day, and finished the rest of the herd on a following afternoon.

The woods and swamp were the animals lived contain about 60 acres.
