**5,000 People at Donnybrook Fair; Dorchester Show a Great Success**

Exhibits Were Splendid—The Receipts Beat Those of Any Previous Year.

That Donnybrook Fair is as popular as ever was strikingly in evidence yesterday when one of the largest crowds that ever visited Dorchester gathered from all parts of the country to attend the great show.

Standing-room was all that was available in the trains going to Dorchester all day, and on every road leading into the village rigs containing people in gay attire could be seen.

The hotel accommodation was over-taxed early in the day, and in some sections of the streets rigs were so thickly placed that there was just room to pass and no more.

No more ideal day could have been chosen for the big fair and everything was carried through without a hitch. All the visitors enjoyed themselves and went home at night tired but well pleased with the exhibition.

President Wade and the energetic directors were well pleased with the success that their efforts had met with and Secretary Neely stated to The Advertiser that the gate receipts were fully \$150 greater than last year, while the exhibits had never been surpassed either in number or quality. Mr. Neely estimated that close upon 5,000 people visited the fair.

**The Feature.**

The feature of the exhibits was undoubtedly the horse and cattle show. The vicinity of Dorchester is the home of some of the best-known cattle-breeders in Canada and they were represented at Donnybrook by a display of animals that would do credit to any fair in the Dominion.

The light and heavy horses were numerous and of such an exceptionally fine quality that the judges decided to award special prizes in several instances.

The display of sheep included some magnificent animals.

The poultry show was said to be the best ever shown at a cattle show. The judges took some time in awarding the prizes so keen was the competition between the birds.

**The Main Building.**

In the main building space was at a premium and the arrangement of the exhibits called forth much favorable comment. The main building was a feature of this building and the excellent quality of the fancy work and embroidery kept a large crowd of ladies admiring it.

Three London clothing houses were well represented by handsome exhibits. They were those of Grafton & Co., Oak Hall and J. H. Chapman & Co.

The races held the attention of the crowd during the latter part of the afternoon and every event was keenly contested despite the somewhat heavy condition of the track.

**BIG WARSHIPS IN FIERCE STORM**

Two Fatalities — U. S. Cruiser Des Moines and Supply Craft in Collision.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 3.—A huge sea which swept over the low bow of the United States battleship Illinois of the North Atlantic squadron in Cape Cod Bay caused the death of Lieut. John S. Furse and injured Chief Boatswain Mate Botcher to such an extent that his recovery is uncertain. Another wave boarded the battleship Minnesota and carried a seaman overboard. Before his shipmates could aid him the man drowned.

In the same storm the supply ship Glacier and the cruiser Des Moines were in collision through the former dragging its anchor. The Des Moines was considerably damaged. The Illinois came to Boston to put Botcher in the naval hospital at Chelsea and to land the body of Lieut. Furse.

Lieut. Furse sustained the injuries which resulted in death while in command of the forecastle division. The men were busy getting over an extra anchor about dusk because of the severe gale then raging. Furse was superintending the task, while Botcher passed the orders along to the seamen who were handling the big anchor. Just as the anchor had been lowered a tremendous wave came over the bows and hurled Lieut. Furse with great force against a stanchion. Botcher was sent spinning down the deck and knocked unconscious. Furse was knocked a distance of 20 feet and was also senseless when picked up.
