BIG WARSHIPS IN FIERCE STORM

Two Fatalities — U. S. Cruiser Des Moines and Supply Craft in Collision.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 3.—A huge sea which swept over the low bow of the United States battleship Illinois of the North Atlantic squadron in Cape Cod Bay caused the death of Lieut. John S. Furse and injured Chief Boatswain Mate Botcher to such an extent that his recovery is uncertain. Another wave boarded the battleship Minnesota and carried a seaman overboard. Before his shipmates could aid him the man drowned.

In the same storm the supply ship Glacier and the cruiser Des Moines were in collision through the former dragging its anchors. They were considerably damaged. The Illinois came to Boston to put Botcher in the naval hospital at Chelsea and to land the body of Lieut. Furse.

Lieut. Furse sustained the injuries which resulted in death while in command of the forecastle division. The men were busy getting over an extra anchor about dusk because of the severe gale then raging. Furse was superintending the task, while Botcher passed the orders along to the men who were handling the anchor. Just as the anchor had been lowered a tremendous wave came over the bows and hurled Lieut. Furse with great force against a stanchion. Botcher was sent spinning down the deck and knocked unconscious. Furse was knocked a distance of 50 feet and was also senseless when picked up. It was found that the officer had sustained a rupture of the liver and that he could not recover. He lived until 4 o'clock in the morning. Botcher sustained a severe injury on the head and lapsed into unconsciousness. He is not likely to recover.

The fleet was at anchor in Cape Cod Bay, about five miles off the entrance to Barnstable harbor during the storm. The force of the wind was terrific and the sea caused the heavy ships of the fleet to roll and pitch badly. All the extra ground tackle on each ship was put out in the endeavor to make all secure. All the ships held right but the Glacier. She lost her anchor and dragged so that she fouled the Des Moines, striking her at the stern and carrying away the two after-deck and one of the boats of the Des Moines. The Glacier had a hole stove in her port bow and her bulkheads were crushed. She also lost several boats.

LOCAL OPTION IN BRANT

Agitation for the Measure Begun in Several Municipalities.

Elmwood, Oct. 3.—The temperance people of the township of Brant met in the Presbyterian Church, Malcolm, recently, when delegates were present from every subdivision of the township. George Sires, of Dunkeld, was elected president, and C. W. Keeling, of Cargill, secretary-treasurer. After considerable discussion it was decided to at once enter upon a vigorous campaign for local option.

Petitions are now in circulation, and if a sufficient number of signatures can be secured the council will be requested to submit a vote at the municipal elections next January. There are four licenses in the township, located in Elmwood, Eden Grove, Cargill and Dunkeld.

FATALITIES IN TORONTO

A Woman Killed by an Auto—Teamster Thrown From Wagon.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Mrs. Della Hazelton, King street, aged 42, was struck by an auto yesterday at the corner of Yonge and Bloor streets, and killed. The woman had just got off a trolley and was crossing the street when she was struck, the auto passing over her neck.

Peter Cavanagh, a teamster, aged 45 years, was killed by an auto at the corner of Yonge and Bismarck streets, and fractured his skull. He died soon afterwards.

Charles McClure, a 5-year-old boy was run over by a street car on King street, and had his right leg cut off.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Rev. T. B. Hyde, the cabinet today the renewal of the 800 loan of \$1,000,000 for six months, was sanctioned.
