> adian prices are higher than the American for the first time in months. In the face of figures like these it easy to determine who pays the Canadian duty, who is benefited thereby, and who is not. The Canadian farmer generally rec ives no higher price than the American-in fact, less for heavies and sows-while the Canadian packer charges the consumer from \$6.75 to \$9 15 more than American prices per barrel.

The Canadian Government collected 2 to 3 cents per pound on the 30,000,000 pounds of American pork imported. The Canadian consumer paid it. He also paid the packers' rake-off on the Canadian product. The farmer was not benefited at all, as the per capita duty of \$1 50 kept the American market closed against him, and the packer used it as a lever to depress the Canadian market for live hogs.

What is wanted is the freest interchange of all animals and animal products. Thorough inspection to protect against disease is all that would be necessary. The producer and consumer would both be benefited. The only parties who would lose by it would be the trusts and revenue departments, whose coffers are filled with the plunder of the people.


