will respect him. The development of healthy, effect ive bodies, should be the first care of an educational system. Everyone familiar with recent pedagogical literature knows of the extensive study and experiment that has been put on the subject of the physical culture of children. The conclusions reached are irrefutable. For abnormal children and those having physical peculiarities, specific exercises are indispensable, but for the average normal child the spontaneous plays and games in the supervised, open-air yards are far superior to any and every formal exercise ever devised difteen minutes of active, joyous play -running, stooping, swerving, shouting in the fresh air-is worth more for the physical well-being of a lot of children than an hour's leg-striding and armstretching. The first is to the other
