INSPECTORS SEIZING LIQUOR TO PUT CHECK ON BOOTLEGGING

Detroit, April 26.—Anticipating efforts by liquor smugglers to get immense quantities of whiskey into Detroit from Windsor before the ban is formally placed on its importation into Ontario, Canadian liquor license inspectors are checking up on every shipment sent to Windsor from Quebec.

Two inspectors, who arrived in Windsor yesterday, were said to have express instructions to seize all shipments of liquor arriving there and hold it until owners appear and prove it is for lawful use.

"The ruling," said one inspector, "applies to practically all shipments, whether one case or one hundred. Persons ordering whiskey for lawful use have nothing to fear. We are after the bootleggers. The only way we see to keep shipments to them from slipping by is to seize them all.
