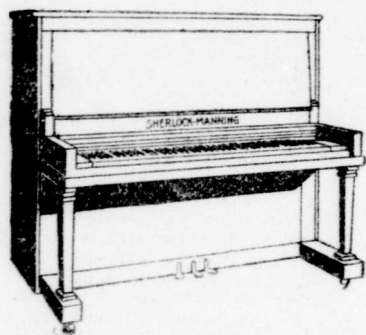

ARREST TWO ON SERIOUS CHARGE

S. N. Culver and Son Held On
Criminal Negligence
Count.

Sequel To Death of Two
Boys Electrocuted in
Pond.

SIMCOE, July 14.—S. N. Culver and his son were arrested today on a charge of criminal negligence. The arrests are a sequel to the tragic death of two young boys about 13 years of age, who, while swimming in a pond on the Culver farm, caught a live wire which had been used for electric light purposes in the winter when the pond was used as a rink. The men were released on \$8,000 bail and will come up for hearing shortly. Mr. Culver is a well-to-do farmer, living on a fine farm near Simcoe.

TO APPOINT 2 MEMBERS FOR NEW IMMIGRATION BOARD

Representatives From Alberta Will
Be Selected By Provincial
Government.

EDMONTON, Alb., July 14.—Two representatives from Alberta to act on a new immigration board covering all Canada will be appointed by the provincial government. This is announced by Premier Greenfield following a conference of his cabinet with Hon. Charles Stewart, federal minister of immigration and colonization, today, when the closer co-operation between the provincial and Dominion authorities in the bringing in of new settlers was discussed. It is proposed, according to the new scheme outlined by Mr. Stewart, to establish a board for permanent service in connection with the immigration work, its membership to comprise representatives of all the provinces, and preferably one man and one woman from each. The board will act in an advisory capacity, and will assist the Dominion government in such campaigns for settlers as may be found desirable, and in such ways as will best meet the needs of the provinces affected.

FIRE ON COAST BREAK OUT AGAIN

VICTORIA, B.C., July 14.—Reports from districts of the southern end of Vancouver Island, at Burrance, Colwood and Metchosin today indicated that forest fires formerly quelled have broken loose again and are now raging. Fighters, exhausted after days and nights in the woods, are being replaced as fast as possible and the situation is in hand, it is said. The high wind of yesterday sent the existing fires roaring down the timbers, but the situation had improved at noon today. With the day came a dropping of the wind, and all fires are now under control, it is thought.

AIRMAN TO PROBE FLYING CONDITIONS IN FAR NORTH

OTTAWA, July 14.—(By Canadian Press).—Flying conditions in the far north of Canada are to be investigated. Attached to the Canadian Government's expedition which will sail shortly from Quebec to maintain Canadian title to islands north of Labrador, will be Squadron Leader R. A. Logan of the Canadian Air Force. Mr. Logan's duties with the expedition will include the investigation of conditions and determining whether flying is practicable, and if so, the most suitable type of machine.

20 STRIKERS ATTACK BUFFALO STREET CAR

BUFFALO, July 14.—Twenty men attacked a street car today when the International Railway Company resumed operations on the Niagara street line, which had been idle for fourteen days following the strike of motormen, conductors and barnmen on the company's Niagara frontier system. Policemen following the car in an automobile charged the crowd and arrested four men. No one was injured.

The company operated nine cars on Niagara street; ten on the Elmwood line, and twelve on Main street Friday. Few persons rode on the trolley cars, the public preferring to patronize the service furnished by several hundred automobiles.

Britain Better Financially Today Than At Any Time Since Armistice

LONDON, July 14.—Declaring that the world's financial situation was still serious, but that Great Britain was stronger financially today than at any time since the armistice, Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer, delivered an address in the Commons today. The chancellor said that at the present rate of exchange Great Britain's debt to the United States would reach \$4,650,000,000. Continuing, the chancellor declared that the recent reduction in Great Britain's floating debt, and the reduction of the internal debt through conversion was the cause for increasing stability in financial matters in this country. The financial position of the world was serious, he said, especially in Austria, which has been growing steadily worse. A great change has occurred in Germany, which gives cause for the greatest anxiety, he concluded.

TORONTO MAN CRUSHED TO DEATH IN ELEVATOR

TORONTO, July 14.—Crushed by an elevator this afternoon, David Murray, aged 70, of Tiverton avenue, died in St. Michael's Hospital tonight. The elevator is used at the Taylor Safe Works for freight purposes and runs for a height of two floors. It is located on the lane side of the building and often it is used by employees as a means of entrance to the plant. It was while Murray was

using this means of ingress that the elevator, which some one had started at the second floor, descended and crushed him. His skull was fractured.

COMMUNIST LEADER DIES.
ZURICH, July 15.—Rosa Bloch, the German Communist leader, died at a local hospital here today, aged 42. She was an intimate friend of the late Rosa Luxemburg and Clara Zetkin. She was active in the German and Swiss extremist movements amongst women.

FRIGHTENED TEAM RUNS OVER DRIVER

SPARTA, July 14.—Two prominent Sparta residents had a narrow escape from serious injury recently. Lee Sprague was stooping in front of his horses straightening a hill of potatoes when something frightened the horses, causing them to dash right over him, catching him in the cultivator and dragging him several feet before he was released. Although no bones were broken he sustained several severe bruises. Joseph Turill had the misfortune to be thrown violently off a load of hay to the ground when the trip rope which he was pulling, broke. As a result his right arm and shoulder are badly bruised and he is otherwise shaken up.
