

Searching Probe Being Made Into Near Prison Escape of Montreal Murderer

GUARDS SUSPENDED AT MONTREAL JAIL

Serafini's Break For Liberty Leads to a Rigid Probe.

PLOT SUSPECTED

Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Aug. 25.—With two guards under arrest and a number of others under suspension in connection with the almost successful attempt on Monday of Giuseppe Serafini, under sentence of death, to escape from the Montreal jail, it is expected that the investigation now being made by the provincial attorney-general's department will have far-reaching and perhaps sensational results. It is thought that at least a complete reorganization of the system of guards in the jails of the province will be an outcome.

Although great secrecy surrounds the investigation some details of the Hochelaga Bank bandit's break for liberty, regarded as accurate, have become known.

It was, according to the information, a fellow prisoner, being held for the juvenile court, who gave the alarm after Serafini had sawed through the bars in the door of his cell, opened two other doors, walked through the corridor, down the stairway of the jail, gained the courtyard, sealed the inner wall and was walking towards the outer wall. In making for the outer wall Serafini took refuge in a pig sty covering himself with hay. Alarmed, a guard commenced a search, and located the escaping bandit when the latter raised his head to see if the coast was clear. The guard covered him with his rifle and he surrendered without resistance and was taken to another cell and put under special guard.

It was reported that a rope ladder was to have been thrown to Serafini when he reached the outer wall, and it is stated that after his capture an automobile was seen to leave the outside of the jail.

No one is being allowed inside the Bordeaux jail now, not even lawyers to see their clients.

NEW LONDON LODGE MAY BE FORMED SOON

Order of Anteduvian Buffaloes Holds Meeting in City.

A movement is on foot in London to establish a lodge of the Order of Anteduvian Buffaloes. This society first started in England during the reign of Queen Victoria and has a membership of several hundred thousand in the British Isles. A meeting was held last night at the home of H. R. Garnett, 286 Adelaide street, which was attended by several men who are residents of the city and belong to the organization.

There are several lodges of the organization in Canada, Toronto, Hamilton and Montreal are all represented in the society, the headquarters for Canada being Montreal. Another meeting will be held at Mr. Garnett's home on Wednesday night, September 3, and all men living in the city who are members of the society are urged to be present. Mr. Garnett is of the opinion that there are at least 50 men in the city who have been admitted to the membership of the organization and is anxious that these attend the meeting so that a lodge may be formed to represent this city.

TOWE SEES INFORMATION ON UNION WAGE RULING

Alderman Towe has asked the city clerk to get an opinion from the city solicitor as to the legality of the city insisting on a union wage in the letting of any contract. This letter, he says, has nothing to do with the matter of the printing tender for the voters' lists, and is merely for his own information.

"The opinion given by the city solicitor," he says, "in Mayor Stevely's time was simply on the matter of the use of the union label. What I want to know is what the law says as to the union wage. I don't believe that the city has a right to force any such condition on a firm doing work for it, but I want to know what is the position of the law in the matter."

IMMIGRATION AGENTS ARE SOUGHT BY GOVERNMENT

Officials Deeply Concerned Over Problem of Boy and Girl Immigrants.

SUITABLE HOMES

Staff Will Be Enlarged to Properly Care For Newcomers.

The Dominion government is at present concerned with the problem of placing boy and girl immigrants on the Canadian farms. In encouraging the immigration of juveniles from the British Isles the government has in view the placing of such newcomers in suitable homes.

In order to see that the new Canadians are well placed in good surroundings where they will have the best chance of developing into useful citizens the government has decided to exercise due supervision over the immigrants.

Men and women immigration agents will be used for the purpose. The women agents have had experience in social service and child welfare work and will be part of their duties to visit those in their territories, and see that the conditions under which they are living is satisfactory, and that they are being well cared for.

In a message to Gordon Philip secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, William Foran, secretary of the Civil Service Commission, states that qualification for women immigration agents will be similar to that of men. They will have to be possessed of a knowledge of practical farming methods in Canada, and will have had practical experience in farming and ability to meet the public and deliver lectures.

Full particulars of the duties, qualifications and nature of examinations that the candidates will have to pass may be had by applying to the Chamber of Commerce.

TOWE HAS SUGGESTION FOR FAIR WEEK TRAFFIC

Would Divert All Machines to Park by Queen's Avenue and King Street.

Alderman Towe, chairman of the traffic commission, will suggest to the commission this afternoon that during Fair week all motor traffic be diverted from Dundas at Wellington and used to the Fair along Queen's avenue and King street. This is in order to make it easier and safer for women and children to alight from street cars at the Fair entrance on Dundas street. He also suggests that the same thing should be done on the east side of the entrance gates, so that the gates are left entirely clear of motor traffic during the week.

Another suggestion is that a stop sign should be placed at the intersection of Talbot and Queen's avenue, which he believes to be a busy and dangerous crossing. He reports that the stop sign at the intersection of Talbot and Queen's avenue is doing good service, and that it is being in controlling traffic at that point.

SUICIDE PRISONER WILL UNDERGO EXAMINATION

John O'Neill, who is in the county jail charged with attempted suicide, will be examined by a doctor of the Ontario Hospital for the Insane, it was learned today. O'Neill was rescued after trying to hang himself in the barn of a district farmer, is very melancholy, and he will probably be returned to his home in Ireland.

It became known today that the day before he attempted suicide, O'Neill suffered from sunstroke. His employer found him running up and down the road in an hysterical state, and escorted him to the farm, where he went to bed. The next morning O'Neill arose early and went to the barn, where he tried to hang himself.

In some southern districts 20 per cent is cut. The department's bulletin says there has been little actual damage from rust, and none from wind or hail. Some damage was done from frost. The crop, it is stated, will be considerably above the ten-year average.

PREMIER SPEAKS AT PETERBORO

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King Will Be Guest at Big Picnic.

Canadian Press Despatch. Peterboro, Aug. 25.—Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King arrived in Peterboro this morning to take part in the big community picnic organized by G. N. Gordon, K.C., M.P., deputy speaker of the House of Commons. The premier is accompanied by Hon. G. P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, and W. E. N. Sinclair, M.L.A., leader of the Liberal party of Ontario.

The itinerary for the premier's day in Peterboro includes a trip over the hydraulic lift lock and the Trent Canal to the golf club for luncheon, a monster parade in the afternoon and a crowded evening of speeches and sport at the exhibition grounds. Tonight's program includes a dinner at which city and county officials and visiting politicians will be guests.

EMPLOYERS RELEASE OVER 10,000 WORKERS

Many Other Firms Show Continued Improvement During July.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Aug. 27.—More than 10,000 persons were released from employment by 5,527 firms making returns to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at the beginning of August. The firms making returns employed 775,759 workers as compared with 786,278 at the beginning of July. The employment situation, while not so good as on August 1, 1935, continues better than in 1931 or 1932.

Firms in the manufacturing division as a whole, notably in iron and steel and in logging and railway construction, showed continued improvement. Canneries registered large additions to staffs.

British Columbia was the province to record an increase in employment.

In Ontario an aggregate working force of 218,029 persons is indicated by the 2,264 reporting firms, who employed 322,881 at the beginning of July.

HAMILTON FIRM TALKS OF PROPOSED MERGER

Hamilton, Aug. 25.—The directors of this city today will formally deal with a proposition made by the National Trust Company of Toronto, to take over the entire assets and business of the local concern and will give out a statement of particulars to the shareholders tomorrow.

Negotiations have been in progress for some time and it is said a very advantageous offer has been made to the shareholders.

HALIFAX SUFFERS DAMAGE IN ATLANTIC HURRICANE

Halifax, Aug. 27.—Considerable damage was caused last night when this city was in the grip of a 50-mile gale which raged throughout the latter part of the night, reaching its intensity at 1 o'clock this morning. The roof garden of the Queen's Hotel was carried away by the wind, blowing over several chimneys and inflicting minor damages to adjoining buildings.

Rev. Mr. Soanes, Aurora, Delivers Interesting Address at Port Stanley.

TELLS OF SIGNS

Rev. Mr. Soanes, Aurora, Ont., delivered a very interesting address last night at the Bible conference at Harrison's Place, Port Stanley, entitled "The Signs of the Times." The address dealt directly with modern and ancient signs, which God had conceived for man's knowledge and conversion. Mr. Soanes referred to a president of France, who asked us chaplain to explain the meaning of religion in a single word. The chaplain replied that the Jew was a perfect example, being 33 1/3 chosen people.

Mr. Soanes continued, that a few years ago, a man who predicted a reparation of the Jews was ridiculed and laughed at. "The Jews," they said, "were, in most cases, prosperous in every country of the world, and it would be an extremely difficult task to bring them to Palestine."

"But God hath His mysteries of grace, and in this present year, thousands of Jews throughout Canada, the United States, and every other country of the globe have flocked back to the Promised Land, believing that the coming of the Redeemer is near at hand."

Rev. Mr. Soanes also made reference to the Great War, explaining that the only great outcome of this bloodshed and carnage was that Jerusalem was restored to the Jews. It is interesting to know that General Allenby, commander of the British forces who captured Jerusalem, is himself a Jew, and, according to the Greek version, his name is interpreted "God is Against Us." When the "Turks" were defending Jerusalem, being acquainted with this interpretation of "Allenby," found that this was the name of the opposing general, they at once surrendered, saying, "There is no use fighting longer, as God is against us."

Sarnia Man Speaks. Rev. Mr. Rhodes of Sarnia then gave an address dealing with miracles, and how He was still bestowing them on man through divine healing.

"Ottawa," began Mr. Rhodes, "when the evangelists, travelling through the country, held a gathering over 12,000 people appeared for divine assistance. 1,500 were being healed while 600 threw their crutches aside and thanked God for their salvation." Mr. Rhodes stated further that even in his own parish, divine healing had been practiced to great advantage, at least three persons professing to be completely cured.

Following Mr. Rhodes' address Mr. Keefe of Connecticut, U. S. A., who had suffered from a serious form of tuberculosis, to such an extent that it was sometimes impossible to kneel and pray, gave a short address. ENGLISH DOMESTICS NOW AVAILABLE HERE

Suitable Girls Can Be Brought From England in Six Weeks.

J. C. Spencer, superintendent of the local government employment bureau, has received a letter from Miss E. Burnham, head of the Women's Department of the Dominion Employment Service, stating that any persons desiring female help, and who are willing to accept English girls for the positions, should communicate with the employment bureau immediately.

Mr. Spencer said this morning that any person in this zone who was desirous of securing help should send a letter to the London office, stating the work that will be required of the girl and the wage they are willing to pay.

As soon as the applications are made the employment service cables to England to obtain a girl to fill the position. It is possible to secure the desired help in six weeks.

When the girls sent out by the English office come to Canada they are asked which part of the Dominion they are desirous of going to. Most of them reply Toronto. Mr. Spencer believes that this is due to the fact that they know so little about the rest of the Dominion, because of the little publicity the rest of the country receives.

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The last lighting figures submitted by the public utilities commission showed that London was paying about \$1.60 per capita for street lighting and that was roughly a dollar and a quarter less than its nearest competitor in the province. 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INSPECTOR CAUGHT BY TAPPING WIRES

William F. Fahy Declares His Arrest Is Merely a Conspiracy.

Associated Press Despatch. Chicago, Aug. 25.—Postal inspectors are silent as to methods by which evidence of alleged complicity in the 2,000,000 bond, Illinois, mail robbery had been obtained against William F. Fahy, one-time "ace" of the local force of inspectors.

The government officials tonight were continuing their checking of new angles of the situation, Fahy's alleged affairs with women and his reported intention to leave the government service.

Fahy, in jail at Geneva, Illinois, in default of \$50,000 bail, asserts that his arrest is the result of a conspiracy against him, and that he is innocent.

HARVESTERS' TRAINS ARE NOW CANCELLED

Railway Officials Are Advised Sufficient Men in West Already.

The harvesters' excursions scheduled to leave London on Sept. 3, has been cancelled by both the C. P. R. and C. N. R. This was done in accordance with the orders received from the government, which stated that the fact that the crop in the west will not be tremendously large the number of men taken out by the railroads on Aug. 26 would be sufficient to harvest the crop.

Local ticket agents said that a number of the tickets for the proposed three or four excursions had been cancelled. The money will be returned to the purchasers.

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Geneva Hotels Filled To Limit

Associated Press Despatch. Geneva, Aug. 25.—So great was the influx of visitors for the sessions of the assembly of the League of Nations that Geneva has on its hands the greatest lodging problem in its history.

Every hotel here is rejecting scores of requests for rooms, and even some of the delegates to the assembly must seek shelter in private boarding houses. Even servants rooms in the hotels have been let to visitors.

BIG PROGRAM PLANNED FOR FINAL CONCERT

G.W.V.A. Band Will Conclude Successful Season on Sunday Night.

The final band concert of the year will be given in Queen's Park on Sunday night by the G. W. V. A. band. These concerts have been given every Sunday night through June, July and August, and have been attended by between five and six thousand persons.

The officials of the G. W. V. A. have been making an effort to have Sir Adam Beck speak at the concert on Sunday night. He is out of town at the present, but it is thought if he is in the city on Sunday night that he will accept.

Several of the most prominent musical artists of the city will be on the program on Sunday night, and band officials are going to make this the best concert of the year.

REGISTRY OFFICE SALE WILL BE OPENED AGAIN
