STREET RAILWAY PAYS FOR PAVING

Company Pays Bill Before Due—Adopts New Policy.

Covering interest charges on paying accounts of the past three years, the London Street Railway Company last night paid up a large portion of its bill to the city of London. City Treasurer James Bell, working over time at his office, received the company's check for \$3,032.37 to cover bill that is not due until December 3. The payment covers interest on advances made to the company for street railway paving in 1922, 1923, and 1924, and also the full cost of paving Richmond street from Bathurst to Barton street this year. The prompt payment of these bills reflects credit on the management of the street railway, city officials say. While the money is due the city payment was not necessary for another three weeks yet. Promptness in making checks indicates an attitude of cordiality and co-operation by the L. S. R. towards the city of London, an attitude which hitherto has not always been apparent. Subsequent checks will follow the general manager, informs Mr. Bell, and these payments will take care of the company's entire bill up to the end of December. The balance due the city includes \$2,106.41 as the last instalment of the general paving account for 1922, \$5,050.16 as the second annual instalment for advances of the city on Stanley street paving in 1923, and \$1,875.80 for the entire cost of paving the street railway's portion of Wellington street this year.

WINDSOR CENTER DRUG SMUGGLING

Authorities Declare Large Quantities of Narcotics Pass Through Border City.

Detroit, Dec. 8.—Windsor is one of the points through which large quantities of narcotics have been smuggled through to the United States, according to the belief of United States attorneys at Cincinnati. They are at the present time engaged in an investigation of the narcotic trade, and a U. S. court indictment charging conspiracy was returned by a federal grand jury at Dayton, Ohio, today, naming a former U. S. drug inspector in charge of the Cincinnati district as the defendant. He is Byron M. Roberts. He is alleged to have hush money for protecting members of a Cincinnati drug ring, and it is also said that he failed to report a narcotic violation. 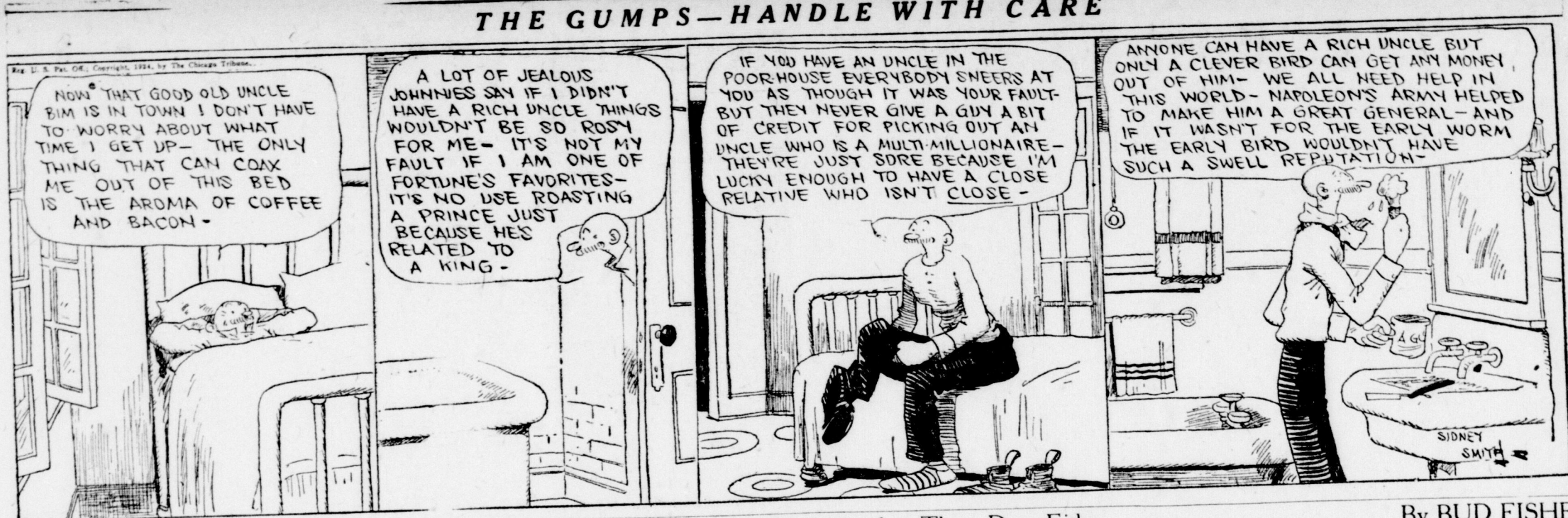

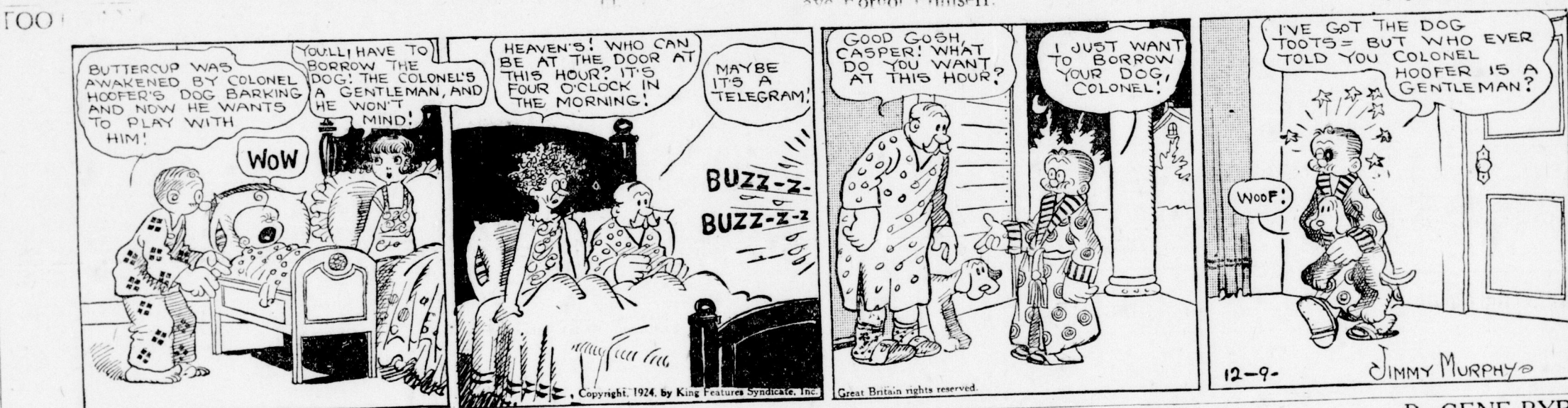

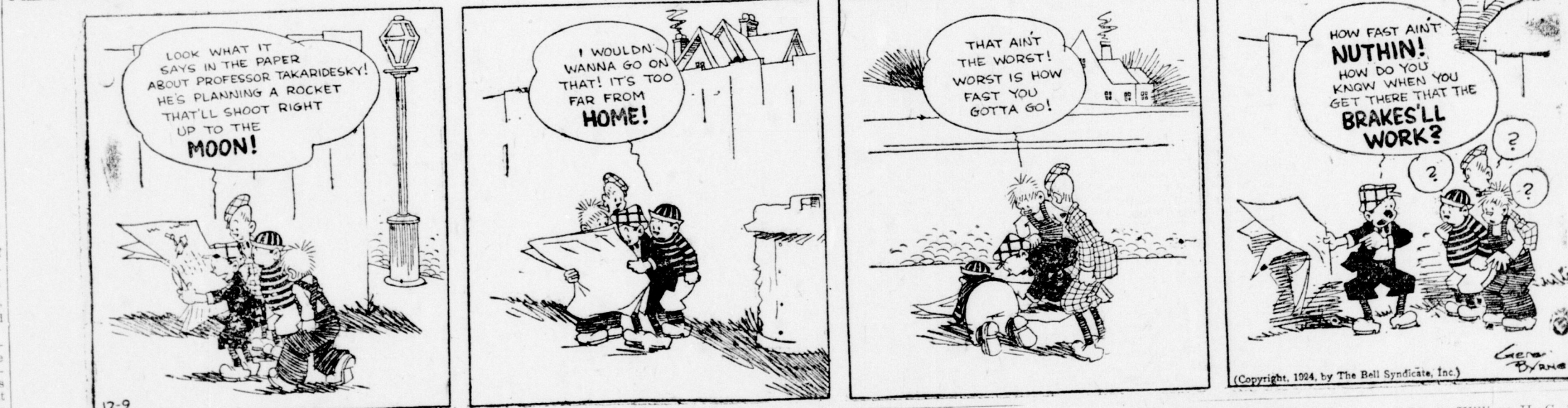

COUNTY COUNCIL CONDEMNS PRESENT TYPE ROAD BUILDING

Paving Similar To Pipe Line Road Style Is Favored.

TO BE DISCUSSED

Middlesex county councillors, in the opening December session at the county buildings yesterday afternoon, went on record individually as not being in favor of the present type of concrete highway being laid by the provincial government. They are in favor, however, of two strips of pavement with a gravel center, such as the Pipe Line road.

Councillor A. L. McDougall precipitated a discussion of the matter when he brought in a resolution asking the council to petition the government to provide a gravel strip on the Lockwood hill, Longwoods road, providing there was any paving to be done. It was a steep hill, and in wet weather would be hard on horses. This led Councillor William Boler of Westminster to remark that the "Delaware hill is a drawback to society."

Councillor Beyer and others also spoke in favor of the gravel center road with strips of pavement at each side. Warden Henry declared that a two-slab road was a good thing for the farmer. The matter was finally

DOUKHOBORS TO PAY HOMAGE TO VEREGIN

Thousands Will Gather at Brilliant To Honor Dead Chieftain.

Calgary, Alb., Dec. 8.—At 1:20 a.m. the hour at which the late Peter Veregin was killed in a railway accident on October 29, 10,000 Doukhobors will gather at Brilliant, B.C., on December 10, 11 and 12 and pay homage to their late leader. In accordance with the old Russian custom, they will gather at the hour of his death for three mornings and parade to his grave. News of this ceremony was given by Peter J. Veregin of Veregin, Sask., nephew of the late leader, on his way to Brilliant. Peter J. Veregin is a nominee for the leadership in the election that will take place at Brilliant on December 15.
