If left year or two the annual growth become tangled mass, and if any bunches are pr the grapes are about the size of peas. annual pruning is necessary to kee growth within bounds and concentrate i and fruit-bearing force into the grapes selves. Amateurs either grow their gra the lateral form or single rod each year, can may extend over the roof of the louse. In either case it is necessary to back last year's growths to a couple of eyes, excepting where a new piece is for filling up a gap, when it is just short point or two.
