EXPLANATION TO ABOVE TABLE.—To measure the temperature of the air, a thermometer Explanation to above Table.—To instaure the temperature of the air, a thermometer should be exposed to the open air where the circulation is unobstructed. It should face the north and should be always in the shade. It should be removed at least a foot from the wall of the building, and should be elevated about ten feet from the ground. It should be protected against the heat reflected by neighboring objects, such as buildings or a sandy soil, and it should be elevated from the rain. To secure these advantages, it is generally found necessary to over the thermometer, with a wooden frame of open lattice, work. The month of July was remarkable in Fredericton for its heavy rainfall, for its low temperature, and for its little sunshine. The mean temperature of the month was 61, 33, which is nearly four degrees lower than the average of the previous ten years. The rainfall measured 7.7 inches. The average rainfall for July in Fredericton is not quite four inches. The hours of sunshine in July, 1882, amounted to 264, an 1883 to 265, but in July, 1884, we had only 147 hours of sunshine. No record of sunshine was kept in Fredericton before August, 1881. During the month, the water in the river rose 7s feet in percentional height.
