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THE ONTARIO GOVERNMENT.

(The Editor of The World.)

Sir: I wish to bring before your readers a few reasons why many think there should be a change of government in Ontario, and that the independent nature of the World will permit of the publication of the same.

First, the Most government have so thoroughly identified themselves with the interests of the province (and now for the second time, though on the first occasion protection had not been proved to be a great benefit) that it would be very incongruous that they should be supported by any one in favor of our national policy (as that of a confederate one).

Second, we need and must have an economical government. The present Ontario government is not really an economical one in any way that is not profitable—thousands and thousands of dollars find their way to certain favored pockets for which the province does not receive a fair equivalent.

Third, the government, contrary to true reform principles, are a centralizing power and patronage instead of leaving it as much as possible with the municipalities.

As yet we have had no more than one or two real summer days. The ice cream season has not set in, nor do the soda fountains flourish as usual on the anniversary of the Dominion's national day.

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MOUNTED POLICE TRAGEDY.

Three Men shot at and Killed by the Mounted Police.

OTTAWA, June 29.—The report of the shooting of the mounted police at Fort MeLeod by Indians is in part perfectly correct. The number of men shot being three, however, instead of six as first stated.

A letter was received yesterday giving particulars of the tragedy. It seems a number of Indians stole some horses belonging to the mounted police. They were reported to the authorities, who promised to send out a squad of police, and recover the animals.

But on their way back, four of them started to dismount, and the three who remained returned to the fort. The four who were shot were the ones who were dismounting.
