

THEY SAY IT WAS BIRCHALL

THE GRAND JURY RETURN AN INDICTMENT OF MURDER.

Only Eight Witnesses Called—Barr Prison Home—An Interview With the Accused Man's Spiritual Adviser—What is a Brother's Duty—Forging the Chain of Evidence—The Broken-Hearted Wife—A Significant Text and a Strange Precedent.

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 19.—Another act in the bloody tragedy was brought to a close at 5½ o'clock, when the grand jury at the Woodstock Assizes returned a true bill against Reginald Birchall for the wilful murder of P. C. Benwell. The jury was unanimous and after listening to the testimony of eight of the principal witnesses, including Douglas Kelly and Alice Smith, expressed themselves satisfied without hearing any further evidence.

The witnesses of yesterday had disappeared and the case is on everybody's tongue. That attention comes not as a single spike but in battalions has been proven here, for today two rape cases, a forgery and an attempted murder have been furnished. These, however, cannot but be a slight ripple of excitement, the entire populace being engaged in discussing the all-absorbing Benwell murder. With the increased interest in the case and the influx of people from the country a change has taken place in the opinions expressed as to the outcome of the trial. A possibility of disagreement, which was spoken of yesterday, has ceased with the majority into a conviction that the man will be found guilty.

Quintessence Murray and Young and the leading counsel, Mr. Oler, have been engaged since early morning arranging the testimony in order. All the witnesses are not present, but the ones who have been examined by the crown as to the nature of their testimony, and the skeleton of the tale of the tragedy which will be related next week is remarkably complete and well arranged. The systematic manner in which the case has been laid out from day to day reads like chapters of a book.

Contrary to expectations Pichall, whose departure about the time of the tragedy caused considerable comment, will not be a witness at the trial. The crown does not want him. The defence claim not to know his present whereabouts.

Program of the Defence. The defence naturally enough declines to show its hand, but the starting developments propounded are not likely to eventuate. From what your representative can learn Birchall's counsel will rely upon shaking the credence of the testimony of witnesses by vigorous cross-examination and by endeavoring to prove that the murdered man had not been killed by the means alleged in the indictment. The defence will also endeavor to show that the accused was not present at the time of the murder.

The defence have several scraps of evidence which they intend to bring forward. 
