

A GREAT BOSTON DIVINE

GRAPHIC FREE-HAND SKETCHES OF
REV. JOSEPH COOK.He Sounds an Alarm-Chicago During
the Fair-The Prospect Appals Him-
Horrors of Vice in Great Cities-New
York Worse Than Chicago.

Rev. Joseph Cook, of Boston, the lecturer and editor of Our Day, a religious and reform journal, and who is almost as well known in Chicago as an evangelist as in Boston, has fears for the moral condition of Chicago during the time the World's Fair is open. Recently in Fremont Temple, he gave the last of a course of six noonday lectures and at that time he sounded the note of alarm.

He accused Chicago of being a hot city under normal and favorable circumstances, and then said that for some months after the last of May next it will be seven times hotter than the hottest former period in its history.

Of the perils of the city he said they are harlots, drunkenness, Sunday anarchy and greed.

The opening sentence struck the key-note of his lecture. It was this: "Chicago will be seven times hotter."

"We are approaching, in the world's fair, an imperial jubilee of civilization; and it is our solemn duty, as a nation, to prevent it from becoming or being accompanied by a local carnival of crime."

Then he said: "Kind word of the city and spoke of New York, as being worse, in one respect at least. It proceeded thus: 'The duties of the mayor of the city of Chicago will be as great as those of the governor of any ordinary state during the time the fair is open. Let us ask, then, what are the prospects as to social evil and moral ascendancy in connection with this great exposition?'"

"It is a fact, and no fancy, that the World's Christian Temperance Union, the largest and most useful organization of women that history ever saw, announces that an effort is being made by places of unrepentant infamy in Chicago to bring to that city 25,000 girls within the next few weeks. A committee of some of the foremost ladies of Chicago recently waited on the mayor to enter a protest against the conspiracy exposed to be hatching on this topic, and the mayor replied to the ladies that he would put the whole power of his office at their disposal. He said that what they wished to prevent was worse than murder."

"Here are realities more horrible than any connections with the bearing of human beings in a fire. There are several things that hurt a man or a woman more than to cut the throat or to grill the whole body, as is stated upon what we may well call a safe."
