CANADIAN CURRENCY TAKES TWO-CENT DROP

Rate of Exchange Rises To 17%c Over Week-End-No Indication of Trend. Week-End—No Indication of Trend.

The optimistic trend of the money market came to an abrupt halt during the week-end, when the rate of exchange between Canada and the United States rose two per cent. Quotations to-day are 17% per cent., compared with the 15 per cent. of last Friday. Financial men are not agitated over the rise, as they take it as merely a fluctuation and not an indication of the future value of the Canadian currency in the States. It is pointed out that there were a large number of bills coming due at the end of the month and the year and that to make these payments there was a greater demand for American currency by Canadians. The demand while it lasts will keep the discount on Dominion funds high for a few days, it is thought.
