





Would Also Relieve Middle School of Collegiates.

A two-year course at Normal School which would relieve the overcrowding of ocal collegiates and weed out students infitted to become teachers, is recomnended by Public School Inspector deoffery Wheable. If the scheme were augurated this year there would be graduates until two years from now nd the surplus number of teachers in he country would be absorbed.
Inspector Wheable suggests that those students intending to become teachers


should take a special course of three years at collegiate and then take their fourth year high school work coupled with practical teaching work at the Normal School. Only those who showed particular aptitude for the profession would be allowed to take the second year term which would grant them their standing as teachers in the province.
In the first year at Normal School it is recommended that those students who were unfitted for the teaching profession should be advised of the fact and urged to discontinue their study along that line. This would mean that a smaller number of students would take the second-year term at normal, while the remainder would lose nothing
