**KYOSHK ACQUITTED ON MURDER CHARGE**

Sarnia, Sept. 22.—Stephen Kyoshk was found not guilty by the jury yesterday which has tried him a second time on the charge of murder.

An Indian named Dan Chawn was the first witness to be called at yesterday morning's session of the court. His evidence went to show that he saw tracks running from the back door in Nayde's house in the direction of the bush. These tracks were two in number and were made by a small shoe, and by a large one, about number ten. He stated that they could not possibly be made by Stephen's shoes.

The two sons of George Williams gave evidence as to where they were on the night of the shooting. They also testified as to how they lost their gun in the St. Clair River, but could not agree as to the time. Provincial Officer Greer, of Toronto, gave evidence as to gun tests he had made at the scene of the murder. He also stated that he knew of nothing in an automatic gun that would make marks on a shell, but this evidence was offset by that of Charles Glenn, a gunsmith of Sarnia, who gave expert testimony on this point, and proved that the ejector of an automatic gun always left marks on the shell.

After this evidence had been taken Mr. Lesueur started to address the jury and made a brilliant appeal. He put strong emphasis on the fact that the three main witnesses for the Crown at the former trial had admitted that they had told lies, and this point was no doubt the main feature of the whole trial. The judge in his address to the jury evidently favored the prisoner, and he pointed out that with such evidence had a very difficult task.

The jurors were out just forty minutes when they returned to the courtroom, while a deep hush fell over the crowd. In a clear voice the verdict of "not guilty" was spoken by the foreman, followed by a subdued conversation by the audience.

The judge, in his address to Kyoshk stated he was pleased with the verdict that had been returned. He stated that he was sorry Kyoshk would have to stay in custody until the Minister of Justice took action on the former case.
