Assimilable Immigrants

Canada is to be congratulated upon the character of its immigration in the last thirteen years. According to the figures just published by the Canadian Minister of the Interior, about 2,500,000 immigrants have reached the Dominion since July 1, 1900. Of these newcomers by far the greater number have been English-speaking people. The United States contributed a little more than 891,000 and the British Isles sent nearly 874,000. From countries where English is not spoken the immigration all told 874,000. From countries where English is not spoken the immigration all told was about 656 000. This means that the bulk of the immigrants received by Canada have been of the easiest assimilable kind. More than 1,700,000 of the 2,500,000 newcomers spoke the language of the country which they entered and they were used to the institutions they found there.
