

Assimilable Immigrants

Canada is to be congratulated upon the character of its immigration in the last thirteen years. According to the figures just published by the Canadian Minister of the Interior, about 2,500,000 immigrants have reached the Dominion since July 1, 1900. Of these newcomers by far the greater number have been English-speaking people. The United States contributed a little more than 801,000 and the British Isles sent nearly 874,000. From countries where English is not spoken the immigration all told was about 656,000. This means that the bulk of the immigrants received by Canada have been of the easiest assimilable kind. More than 1,700,000 of the 2,500,000 newcomers spoke the language of the country which they entered and they were used to the institutions they found there.

 The price was in the neighborhood of \$5. A Chicago dispatch now relates the case of the steer for \$19.25. When killed and cut up the edible parts of the beast brought \$99.21 at retail price. The tidy little sum of \$79.96 disappeared somewhere between the producer and consumer. Nor is that all, for the packer, in addition to what he sold to the retailer, disposed of the unedible portions of the carcass for \$19.50, or 25c more than he paid for the steer.
