# PARISH NOTES.

The new Sidesmen are getting their hands in. Mistakes are natural to new hands, and mayhap a stranger is put into a pew which belongs to an old pewholder. Be patient! Give them time. Mistakes will be fewer Sunday by Sunday.

When people are in arrears for Church dues, or fail to bear their proper share of Church expenses, the burden falls upon others and

somebody else has to suffer. And then there is that bank interest on the over-draft! (From a Warden's soliloquy on Sunday morning).

The Wardens have been making the Church fabric safe by some absolutely indispensable repairs. The weather for years past had worked down into the gables and walls and done much injury. A good deal of glass had been broken, and the sky-light was badly damaged. The fabric is now safe for years to come, but \$500 more ought to be expended in painting and improvements. Who, in his own house, would put up with torn carpets and shabby matting visible to every eye! It is hoped at least that the indispensable repairs will be "cheerfully" paid for!

It will be a satisfaction to those who love St. George's to know that we have not been found wanting in our Diocesan duties. Our quota for the Mission Fund was put at \$365, and, including amounts given during the year, was made up in full with \$20 to spare for the General Purposes and Church Extension Fund, and \$10 for the Divinity Students Fund. The amount of our assessment was made up as follows:-Woman's Auxiliary, \$75: Thanksgiving Day Offerings, \$95.81; Children's Offerings (Sunday School and Mission boxes), \$25.44; January collection, \$30.50; the recent appeal did the rest. Besides, our promise of \$25 to the Japan Mission was made up between the W. A. and the children; the children, moreover, giving \$16 to the Indian Homes. In the Synod Report of this year there will be no blanks opposite St. George's, while the Children's Column will credit our children with \$56.44. When the children take an interest in Missions we have no fears for the future of the Church.
