NEW Desktop FAX Capability direct from your desktop to the world

As recently announced, sending a facsimile has just been made easier. An e-mail-to-fax capability has been developed enabling us to send facsimile messages directly from ICONDESK to an unlimited number of recipients in North America and overseas who are not accessible by e-mail. This capability has been tested extensively and is now available to all users at HQ.¹ Release to missions is pending the UNIX upgrade process.

Only UNCLASSIFIED documents can be sent using the desktop facsimile capability. Transmission of PROTECTED A documents are ONLY permitted through MITNET.

Procedures for preparing and sending UNCLASSIFIED FAX messages from ICONDESK are contained in the "ICONDESK FAX Gateway Learning Guide" (i:\corpinfo\Training\Workshop\ Iconeng\faxgate.eng) A new address template, "-FAX Template/Modele TELECOPIE," has been added to the top of the ICONDESK directory to aid in addressing FAX recipients. If you have questions, please contact SIGNET Support or go to the Learning Lab on D1 (SERV) on Mondays and Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.. Staff from the Informatics Learning Centre (SXCL) will be on hand to help you.

Messages prepared in ICONDESK are automatically sent by FAX to the numbers you specify in the FAX address template. The Note portion of the ICONDESK message will start after the Comments heading on the FAX cover sheet. If the note is long, it may go on to the next page. Any WordPerfect (WP) or ASCII attachments included with the message appear after the (bilingual) FAX cover sheet and the note. The attachment(s) will start on a new page. We recommend avoiding the use of tables or graphs in your WP attachments. WordPerfect attachments created by Zmenu macros will print as expected, with one important exception: the logo will not print.

The e-mail-to-fax capability is an efficient and effective business tool. It allows faster communication and more reliable transmission of facsimiles. It also allows FAX messages to be easily copied to CATS — please don't forget to CC CATS on these messages, if required.
