INTEGRATION OF VETERANS CHARTER WITH SOCIAL WELFARE PROGRAMS

Hon. W. G. Dinsdale (Brandon-Souris): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Veterans Affairs. It arises from a reply given by the Prime Minister the other day which indicated that veterans benefits are being included in general social welfare policy. Is it now the policy of the government to integrate the veterans charter, which gives veterans special rights arising from the special services they rendered to the country, with general welfare programs?

Mr. Speaker: Order. This question was asked in similar terms on at least one occasion. I am not sure whether there is any point in having the minister give the reply which he has already given to the House.

Mr. Dinsdale: On a question of privilege, Mr. Speaker, the reason I am asking this question is that there was ambiguity in the answer and I have now phrased the question in such a way as to avoid that ambiguity. I am asking specifically whether the veterans charter is being integrated with the general social welfare programs?

Hon. Jean-Eudes Dubé (Minister of Veterans Affairs): No, Mr. Speaker, it is not. There is quite a distinction between social legislation and social welfare. What the Prime Minister has said and what I have said is that veterans benefits are part of social legislation, not social welfare.

Mr. Dinsdale: I have a supplementary question arising from that answer, Mr. Speaker. In view of the minister's further reply, is it his intention to review the benefits under the veterans charter and increase them in light of the rising cost of living, prior to the general review of social welfare programs?

Mr. Dubé: Some of the benefits provided for veterans are now being reviewed under the white paper and are before the Veterans Affairs Committee at the present time.
