

REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE BEACH.

ART. 68—That part of the beach extending from the north east boundary of the port of Montreal to the line of St. Victor Street, near Bonscour's Church, shall be considered, in future, and the same is hereby declared to be, the port for square timber, fire-wood and scows, except the space of one hundred feet opposite the New Market Gate. Rafts of fire-wood and scows shall be placed in that space included between Madame Dufy's gate and the distance of fifty feet to the south west of the said New Market Gate. Square logs, sawed timber and staves shall be placed in the space comprehended between the distance of fifty feet to the north east of the New Market Gate and the north east boundary of the city, except in all that part of the beach from the lane leading to the water side, between Bonscour Church and the Barracks and the Upper Ferry kept by Patenode; on which last mentioned part of the said beach rafts of fire-wood and timber may be landed for His Majesty's service; and when it may happen that rafts of fire-wood and scows cannot be landed in the limits above mentioned, such rafts and scows shall be placed below the said Ferry, and not elsewhere, under the penalty of twenty shillings, to be paid by the person offending against this regulation; besides five shillings a day, from the time such rafts or scows shall have been landed, as aforesaid, till they are taken away.

ART. 69—All rafts of fire-wood which may have been sold shall have a preference as to place and situation to other rafts, for the conveniency of unloading the same, under the penalty of twenty shillings to be paid by the person or persons who shall oppose the same.

ART. 70—The space of one hundred feet above
