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an Hisy be behurried y. The such involuntary errors, is, to retract them on conviction, in such manner as to undeceive the Reader, whom he has unknowingly misled, and healing the wounds he has unwittingly inflicted. Thus the injured person will have reason to be satisfied, and the Public will forgive the writer's errors in consideration of his integrity.—With such a declaration, if any individuals may have felt themselves offended with any statement in the foregoing part of this History, the Author engages that upon conviction of the errors that may have crept into his book, they shall be corrected, as an act of humanity, as well as of justice due to the party aggrieved.
