## SMALL BOY AS VICTIM

Altho Alarm Sounded at Once, Boy Was in Water Some Time.

GALT, May 8.—Harold Brown, aged seven, was drowned at the Galt dam today. The lad was playing near the retaining wall, lost his balance and fell into the water. The fire bell sounded, and the firemen found the body with hooks after 20 minutes submergence. Life was extinct. If diving had been resorted to doctors say that the lad's life might have been saved. Dr. Radford, coroner, is making inquiries. The parents of the boy arrived in Galt from Devonshire, England, a month ago.

METEOROLOGICAL OFFICE, Toronto, May 8.—(8 p.m.)—The depression which was situated this morning in the Ohio Valley now covers the Middle Atlantic states, and another moderate depression is centred in Saskatchewan. Rain has fallen today in the vicinity of Lake Erie, and has been everywhere fair and for the most part moderately warm.
