All Proprietors and Farmers occupying lands, adjoining the King's Highways commonly called front Roads, are upon the breadth of their lands respectively to keep in good repair the per Highways and Ditches. But where the repairs of any Highway, are to be borne by several Proprietors facing each for other, every Proprietor or Farmer shall repair the whole width of that part of the Highway which shall be alloted to him by the Majority of three Overseers not interested therein, who shall draw up a record thereof and deliver a copy of it, if required, to each of the parties interested; but no Farmer or Proprietor, whose land is not more than thirty arpents in depth, is obliged to repair at his own expense more than one the Highway upon the breadth of his farm—Sec. 3.
