





Press.) -As the result of an investigation that has been quietly carried on by officers of the provincial board of health under the direction of Dr. Elzear Pelletier, secretary, and Dr. Beaudry, chief inspector, startling revelations have been brought to light showing the careless disregard with which the municipali-ties in various parts of the province treat smallpox outbreaks. Often no precautions are taken to isolate the sufferer and disinfection of patients nd belongings is practically unknown As a consequence the disease spreads and scores of cases have been located by the provincial inspectors.
