

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THE FLOW OF GOLD.

Exports to the United States Will Continue—The Day of Cheap Money is at an End.

New York, Sept. 13.—Mr. Harold Frederic cables from London to "The Tribune": "The change in the Bank of England's rate of discount will not prevent the continuance of gold exports to the United States, nor was it ordered for that purpose. One of the best informed bankers predicts that the rate will be raised again in the course of the week, and that the conditions of gold would continue to go to America even to the extent of 10 per cent. The withdrawal of \$5,000,000 for America does not suffice to explain the sudden increase in the gold export.

"A curious element of the monetary situation is the Japanese gold deposit of London into the Bank of England. This has largely increased the bank's stock of gold, but since it may be withdrawn any moment for industrial purposes, it is not available as a gold reserve, but is held in the vaults for safe keeping. The bank's gold reserve, therefore, is not so large as it appears to be, and it is a mystery, if the navy is to be strengthened it will not leave England. Lombard Street has heard a rumor that Japan, being short of gold, has ordered the Bank of England to issue paper currency of \$2,000,000,000, which is not believed. The Japanese deposit, under the existing conditions, is simply held in reserve for future demand, and does not increase the bank's gold reserve.

Another feature of the monetary situation is the increased production of gold in South Africa, where, after a protracted period of political difficulty, the gold output has surpassed all previous efforts.

CHEAP BLACKMAILERS. A Tale of Scoundrels Was Bally Used Up by a Fistic Gentleman Who Was Looking for Them. During the summer months a number of cheap blackmailers have been busy in the vicinity of the parks by posing as detectives and policemen in plain clothes. Their scheme was to levy a fine on a man and woman who happened to be passing through the parks after dark. The couple were taken to a room, and the man was held until the woman had paid the fine.

ARMENIAN QUESTION. Rev. Dr. Wild Justifies Great Britain's Policy of Non-Interference With Turkey. After an absence from the city for a considerable period, Rev. Dr. Wild yesterday preached at the English Wesleyan Congregational Church. Whatever may have been the opinion entertained by some concerning his continued ability to attract a large congregation, the evidence afforded at last evening's service was most conclusive. Long before the hour for commencing the service the church was packed, the aisles being filled and the crowd of disappointed worshippers extending outside to the sidewalk.
