OUR DEBARY'S APPOINTED

Officers Chosen to Enforce the Alien Labor Law in Canada.

Rebellion Claims Commissioner Receives \$15 Per Day—Letter to Rome Discussed in the House—Government Playing a Double Game—Sir Wilfrid Tries to Disown Authority—Early Adjournment of the Sitting. Ottawa, May 11.—(Special).—A number of questions by members were answered by the Ministers this afternoon. Mr. Darte informed Mr. Davin that no penalties were imposed on the contractors for the delay and abandonment of the celebrated Edmonton bridge. Mr. Davin was informed by the same Minister that Mr. Gibson had been deposed from the position of Inspector of Government Telegraph lines in the Northwest. The Foreign Office, replying to a question by Mr. Bennett, said that Mr. J. Cockburn had resigned the postmaster-generalship of Grenada, and that Mr. J. Cockburn, age not known, appointed in his place on the recommendation of Mr. H. H. Cook of Toronto. Mr. Davin asked what was the effect of the announcement of reduction in the rate of interest in postoffice savings banks—had deposits decreased and withdrawals increased? The Finance Minister, in reply, said that he had no announcement to make on that subject, but that, as usual in April, the returns for the last April showed a decrease of deposits to the amount of \$5,000,000. Fifteen Dollars a Day for Nothing. In reply to a question by Mr. Davin (Liberal, Saskatchewan), Mr. Sifton said that Mr. Thomas McKay of Prince Albert had been appointed Receiver-General, Commissioner for the Government for 645 days at \$15 a day, Sundays included, and expenses, receiving altogether \$9,675.

Agents for Alien Labor Act. Mr. Clarke was informed that the following agents have been appointed to enforce the Alien Labor Act: A. O. Martin, Acting Sub-Collector of Customs, Hamilton, N.W.T.; The Acting Sub-Collector of Customs, Gretna, Man.; G. G. Allen, Preventive Officer, Emerson, Man.; W. F. McCrea, Immigration Commissioner, Winnipeg, Man.; W. B. Lewis, Collector of Customs, Fort Erie, Ont.; Robert Bush, Provincial Constable, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.; J. P. Spahn, Collector, Niagara Falls, Ont.; James H. Keenan, Collector Inland Revenue, Windsor, Ont.; P. Spahn, Brazebridge, W. B. Bills respecting the Government harbors, piers and breakwaters, respecting the protection of navigable waters, and the Senate bill to amend the Companies Act, were read a third time and passed.

That Letter to the Pope. On a motion to open a Committee of Supply, Mr. McDougall (Conservative, C.B.) brought up the letter to the Pope in connection with the Manitoba School question, signed by Mr. Tarte and forty other members of the Government, as well as a number of the Opposition. This letter having gone on the Hansard last session, Mr. McDougall claimed that also on record, and thereupon he proceeded to read the Pope's encyclical on the subject. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reply was brief, and in effect was that the encyclical was not addressed to the Canadian Government, but to the world at large and the document was not the Government could have no official knowledge of it. Mr. Bergeron then took up the discussion and reviewed the political aspect of the question, pointing out how the Liberals had deceived the people of Quebec by promising to give the minority more than they had intended to give. He claimed the question was not settled yet, nor had the attempted settlement been accepted by the majority of the Roman Catholic population of Manitoba. Proceeding, he reviewed the negotiations with Rome, the relations of the Province of Quebec, the situation of the Province of Ontario, the situation of the Province of New Brunswick, and the situation of the Province of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Bergeron, after referring to the introduction of the papers printed in Rome, and especially Sir Wilfrid Laurier's memorial informing the Vatican that the late Government had not been able or willing to accomplish anything for the minority in Manitoba. In this memorial the Premier pointed out that 45 out of 98 Catholics were supporters of the Government and in his (Mr. Bergeron's) opinion seemed to convey generally the assurance to Rome that Catholic interests would be better protected by a Government with a Catholic at its head than it would have been under the late Government. Sir Wilfrid: Does that document to Rome? Mr. Bergeron: I pretend nothing of the kind, but I have a document here printed in Rome with the name of the honorable gentleman upon it. Sir Wilfrid Laurier rose to say that the memorial was simply one of many documents gathered together in one publication for the better understanding of the school question.

Double Game Revealed. Mr. Bergeron, continuing, said that only a few days ago he had asked whether a memorial, or other document, signed by the Premier had been sent to Rome, and had been answered in the negative. He could say that the Government had all along deceived the Catholic people and it was now shown that they had deceived the Protestant population by this appeal to Rome. It was an unfortunate day for Canada when the Government of this country had to appeal to a foreign power. Debate was adjourned after reference to the death of Mr. D'Alton McCarthy. The House adjourned at 10 p.m.

Manitoba Prospects Bright. Mr. W. D. Scott, Manitoba Immigration Agent, who has returned from Winnipeg, says the evidences of prosperity in the Province are most numerous and to-day, Building operations are active in Winnipeg and the towns. In the country generally the prospects are most promising. Wheat is up above the ground and the weather has been so favorable that the crop in the country are more numerous, and of a better class than for years.

The convent of Sisters of the Precious Blood was crowded with visitors yesterday morning to witness the reception into the order of Miss Winifred Madden and Miss Elizabeth Matthews. The former accepted a beautiful \$1,000. Rev. Dr. Treacy of the seminary was present, and the sermon was preached by His Grace Archbishop Walsh.
