GOLDMAN ROWING ONCE A DAY.

Eight to Be Selected Shortly and Four Spare Men Will Cross the Water.

The Argonaut Henley eight and Goldman have at last got thoroughly settled down at the Don Rowing Club at the foot of Cherry street. Some time ago this club kindly placed the use of their clubhouse at the disposal of the Argos, who will thus be enabled to row in the cut which leads to Ashbridge's Bay, no matter what the weather is like on the Bay. On Tuesday afternoon four men rowed the eight, the rest of the crew being on the bank, a heavy sea running from the east; the balance of the crew and a few enthusiasts being taken down in an express wagon. The crew took a good, sharp spin down the cut and back, when they were coached by Edward Hanlan.

Yesterday was the day they had the best practice, and the two trials were most satisfactory. The very warm atmosphere enabled the men to row the world's famous, and will be picked from the following: G. H. Doherty, J. N. Mackenzie, W. N. Linton, H. G. Kingston, A. Boyd, J. Leslie, F. H. Thompson, R. G. Munz, R. G. Munz (stroke), R. K. Barker (cox). The men left over after the crew has been picked will likely be taken as spare men. H. L. Cowan and H. Gooderham, who are at their own expense, will be on hand as additional spare men if necessary. By having four extra men available it will enable the crew to take a rest for a day or two, when they feel a lay-off would be beneficial. Goldman is at present only rowing once a day, but later on expects to be out twice daily. He finds it more difficult to get into condition this spring, owing to not having taken any gymnasium work during last winter.
