Some of these horrible instruments of death are gaily decorated with feathers and tails of horse hair, that do not enhance them in the eyes of the beholder; it is as though we were to gaily decorate our guns and swords that were to be used in carnage.

In this same case, beside these war clubs and dreadful weapons, is a curious enough the Mohawk prayer book of 1774; it contains the English and Iroquois names of the Chippewa translation. It was prepared by Chief Brant in his early life, and printed in England, where it was sold for the independence of the United States.

There is a lovely collection of Indian pipes of all shapes and sizes; that sent by Big Bear to General Middleton at Fort Pitt, during the rebellion of 1863 is here, and has therefore historic value. Dr. Spencer of Bloor-street exhibits a beautiful Indian pipe, which was found near the corner of Yonge and Bloor-streets. It is decorated with perfectly carved figures of a man and a woman, and the man is holding a bow and arrow, and the woman is holding a basket.

In another case is a curious little double-barred cross—whose meaning is not given—but which is supposed to be one of three that are in existence. Only enough, however, it turns up in the same case with a shawl, the guardian of health, a sacred relic of the Hurons.
