The rate is sixpence for 20 words. There
is the slightest doubt that if the Gov-
ernment of Canada owned and oper-
ated the telegraph lines, the rate would
be reduced to a ten-cent rate.
In most towns in Canada there are
no telegraph offices. Neither of these
is necessary if the business were
run through the postoffice. The success-

been the British and other European com-
panies, which have been able to justify
their business in short order.
