Mr. Hay's Great Work.

Mr. Hays has been general manager of the Grand Trunk System since Jan. I, 1896, since which time the capital stock has attained an enhanced value of some \$80,000,000 over the market price of 1895. This improvement is materially due to the increased payment of dividends to the English stockholders, amounting to \$3,762,494 for the four years ending Dec. 31, 1895. This dividend payment is only \$2,814,025 less than the net dividends earned in the entire 10 years preceding the time when Mr. Hays took charge of the property. Since that time the company has added the Central Vermont to its system. Under Mr. Hays' regime hundreds of thousands of dollars have been and are now being expended on the improvement and equipment of the system.

Before taking charge of the affairs of the Grand Trunk Mr. Hays was general manager of the Wabash Railway, and previously occupied a similar position on the Missouri Pacific.
