In the basin of the Mosse River there were \$2,000,000 acres fit for cultivation, covered with spruce timber, of which there are 200,000,000 cords fit to be sent to the mill. He advocated conserving the great timber resources of the country, and was in favor of the Government building the Lake Temiscaming Railway. The Government was slow in moving along these lines, and had to be kicked into a policy before adopting it.

Mr. W. H. Hoyle, M.L.A. for North Ontario, said the Opposition was willing to assist the Government in its enterprises respecting New Ontario, and was in favor of the Government railway from North Bay to Lake Temiscaming. He thought technical education should receive all the aid the Government can bestow on it, and both political parties were in favor of reforestration as a permanent asset of the Province.
