Decision on Point of Law. Yesterday judgment was given by Judge McDougall in the case of Matthews v. Robertson et al, and holds, altho not free from doubt, that an architect being a party to a suit may be examined for discovery as regards the figures and estimates upon which he bases his final certificate. Whilst this is an interesting matter of law practice, the decision being on a mere preliminary point does not in any way determine the rights of the parties. Unless such examination proves that the architect has been guilty of fraud in making his certificate, the contractor architect has been guilty of fraud in making his certificate, the contractor cannot recover against the owner on the ordinary building contract. The architect's certificate must be first obtained before the owner is liable, unless it is held back fraudulently or there is fraud in making it, and this point can only be decided at the trial, which will probably take place in the County Court next week.
