Fekin, Jan. 7.—At a meeting to-day all the Foreign Ministers, except Minister Conger, signed the joint note informing the Chinese government that failure to fulfilits obligations (in refusing to pay the wai indemnity on a gold basis), as orovided for by the peace protocol, would entail grave consequences.

The Russian customs negotiations still centinue. The British and Japanese representatives have advised the Chinese to reject the proposals and the Chinese say they will do so. The Russian representative suggested modifications of the origina scheme with the object of securing control of the Manchurian customs.
