Montreal Live Stock.

Montreal, April 13.—The cattle market here has been a very small affair today, with the first trip for the season. The offerings of the East End Abattoir today consisted of about 115 cattle, 200 calves, 40 sheep, 12 spring lambs and 25 store hogs. The butchers were not numerous and their wants were not large, but the prices of good cattle were higher than on last week's market. Prime beefs sold at from 45c to 50c per lb.; medium stock at from 35c to 45c; and the common cattle at from 25c to 30c per lb. Calves sold at from \$1.75 to \$7 each. Sheep sold at from 35c to 4c and the yearlings at from 45c to 55c per lb. The prices asked for the store hogs were from \$5 to \$12 each. Very few fat hogs were for sale today and the last sales were made at about 65c per lb., weighed off the cars.

York Township Council.

A special meeting of York Township Council was held on Monday afternoon, April 13th, at the residence of Mr. J. J. McLaughlin, 246 St. Nicholas Street. The meeting was presided over by Mr. J. J. McLaughlin, who was unable to be present, and his place was occupied by Councilor George Sykes. The following business was transacted: A resolution was passed that the bridge over the Glen-road bridge, an ever recurring topic and one that has been prominently discussed in connection with the bridge was originally constructed by the Scottish and Ontario Land Co. some 20 years ago. It has now fallen into disrepair and is a menace to life. The Council of York Township are unwilling to assume any liability in the matter. While some action must shortly be taken Council yesterday moved to still further defer the matter. The report of the auditors was submitted, it was voluminous and showed the finances of the township to be in a flourishing condition.

The Committee on roads and bridges, consisting of Messrs. Maclean, Hrynski and Sykes, recommended that the petition of Alfred Logan and 31 others relative to improvements on Wagon-avenue and Kingston-road be granted. Council will appropriate the sum of \$500 to this work. The Laura Second National Monument Committee wrote the Council asking their co-operation toward the fund which is being raised for this purpose. A review of the prospectus would seem to indicate that the response to this fund is not as spontaneous as could be desired. Up to the present time \$400 has been subscribed, while the committee have anticipated looking toward a \$10,000 monument.
