NOT FOR OURS.

London, April 25.—The Daily Chronicle says that a responsible Canadian correspondent states that after the next general election the present Dominion government will be compelled by public opinion to reduce the tariff duties on woollens less than 30 per cent, and this rule will soon apply to all English goods.

WRAPS CANADA.

London, April 25.—Arnold White, in the Sunday Sun, reminds Canada that her forces would be unable to defend her coast in the event of a prolonged period. The influence of the British navy was like the atmosphere, which was not seen but yet death followed its withdrawal.

To Proclaim General Strike.

Buda-Pesth, April 24.—The government has rejected the suggestion made by a committee representing the railway strikers, that the employees be allowed to return to work on the terms previously offered. Two deputies have been sent to the government to inform the strikers that the government will proclaim a general strike. There were demonstrations in sympathy with the strikers to-night.

CANADA'S WHALE FISHERIES TO BE KEPT FROM YANKEES

Minister of Marine and Fisheries to Introduce a Bill Covering the Matter.

Ottawa, April 24.—(Staff Special.)—By the bill to amend the fisheries act, which has received its first reading in the commons, the machinery is provided for asserting jurisdiction over the whale fishery in Hudson Bay, where for years the industry has been prosecuted by Americans practically without let or hindrance.

By the new bill, however, the minister of marine is given power to exact a license fee from all vessels engaged in the whale fishing in Canadian territorial waters. The penalty for fishing without a license is to be \$500 to \$5000.

HOPEFUL.

Sault Ste. Marie, April 24.—The general tone of business is better than it has been in nearly two years. Every body is hopeful now. While these conditions apply more to the Canadian South than the American, the announcement made by President Taft this morning that work would be begun on the power house within a few weeks, putting it in condition to be cleared up, is especially encouraging.

ALVERTON OBITUARY.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, April 25.—Lord Alverton, presiding at the St. George's banquet at the Cecil Hotel, said the history of the last few years is a record of tribulation. He said that the rail mill already has orders on hand and will begin to start as soon as navigation opens and they can get over the ice.

CONFLAGRATION RISK.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, April 25.—The Times insurance correspondent says the Toronto fire will give an impetus to the movement to change the contribution risk premium of 1 per cent. The conditions of Canadian towns fully justified it, but it would be a relief to the Canadian industries. The fire insurance of Canada was seven times higher than in Britain, yet it was notoriously unprofitable.

NONE LESS THAN 30 PER CENT.

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STEEL FRAMES A PROTECTION. With Flame-Resisting Windows, Buildings Safe From Exposure.

An article in The New York Times, commenting on the Baltimore conflagration, which is of importance to Toronto, as concerns the lessons of such disasters, contained the following opinion from P. M. Stewart, formerly superintendent of buildings for Manhattan:

"The most important lesson to be drawn from the Baltimore fire is that of the exposure hazard. Rising above the widespread area of devastation are a number of buildings of the so-called fireproof type. As regards a fire originating within their own walls, they are fire resistant in high degree, but by reason of their structure they present a great area of wall space to the attack of flame from without. It is the universal opinion of the fire engineers who have escaped that had the Calvert, the Equitable, the Continental Trust, and the few other steel framed buildings been provided with efficient window protection, such as wire glass in metal or metal-protected frames, with some type of flame-resisting shutters, they could have suffered no more serious damage than the chipping of corners from the stone facing of their lower floors, and some of the windows would have escaped that on the first attack of flame from without, these structures took fire at their unprotected windows and were destroyed at the same instant. The fire swept thru them like water thru a sieve, and instead of standing as invulnerable barriers which spread the conflagration beyond, their burning furniture converted them into furnaces, and every window to pouring out an irresistible tongue of flame to reach and consume the contents of the building. No other branch of fire protection is receiving as much attention as the exposure hazard, and while the Baltimore conflagration has been a warning, it is known on this subject, it has great value in emphasizing the fact that the safety of a building depends upon adequate fire protection from without."

THE RADIUM FAMILY.

Two New Additions—Sir W. Ramsay's Startling Calculation.

London News: The report that Dr. Charles Baskerville, of North Carolina University, has discovered two new elements of the radio-active group did not excite any surprise on the part of the eminent English investigator, Sir William Ramsay.

"Yes," said he to a reporter in the gloomy underground caverns of University College, where these uncanny elements are confined, "I have no doubt Baskerville is to be relied on when he says he has discovered these two new elements, which he calls carolinium, after the State of Carolina, and Berzelium, after Berzelius, the Swedish chemist. I know Baskerville, who is a good chemist and a straightforward man, and I should place every reliance on his announcement."

IN CANADA'S NAME.

Ottawa, April 24.—Canada's northern expeditions the coming summer and next year will raise the British flag on the Arctic islands claimed by Canada at points of importance on the Hudson Strait and north of the Hudson Bay.

had been an original deposit it would have gone long ago.

"That is so," replied the scientist, quietly.

"Then whence comes radium?"

"You are getting into the region of mere speculation. We do not know. Possibly from uranium."

But that only creates a new difficulty. Hitherto we have had the suggestion of radium, with its great atomic weight, breaking up by progressive disintegrations into lighter substances. Now you suggest the heavy radium atom may come from the lighter one of uranium?"

"It is certainly a difficulty," acknowledged Sir William. "It is hardly worth discussing questions which are merely speculative. We have no grounds for forming an opinion, of course, radium must come from somewhere. One cannot say that two atoms of uranium may not contribute to the building up of one of radium."

"And the old Adam among the atoms, the substance which starts or starts the series of transmutations we call the world, you cannot trace?"

"I wish we could," sighed the great scientist.

It is evident that the calculation of Sir William Ramsay and Mr. Soddy makes a profound change in the view which must be held as to radium and its meaning. Instead of a primary substance, which has been slowly disintegrating into other elements since the world began, radium is merely a temporary phase, an unstable intermediary in a series of transmutations of beginning, the end, nor the meaning.
