The Organ Opening.

Dedication of the Magnificent Instrument at the Dundas Center Church.

Rare Recital by a Noted Organist-A Fine Programme.

The new organ of the Dundas Street Center Methodist Church was opened crowded the handsome edifice. Many were unable to gain admission, and missed an exceptional musical treat. the First Presbyterian Church, New York, an artist of more than continental reputation. He was a pupil of M. Guilmant, the Paris celebrity, who composed three selections for Mr. Carl and dedicated them to him. Mr. Carl also won triumphs at the World's Fair and at the Edinburgh and Stockholm international expositions. His performance last night confirmed his title as a great organist, and fully realized the expectation of his auditors. Perhaps his most popular number was Breitenbach's "Storm," a vivid musical portrayal of the varying moods of nature—the soft repose broken only by the shepherd's pastorale, the faint tremor of a rising storm, the gradual crescendo marking its approach, and then ! the swell and peal of the tempest, calling out the full power of the organ, its tones receding and dying into a sweet vesper hymn. This descriptive masterpiece was encored, Mr. Carl responding with "The Evening Star," from Tannhauser. Mr. Carl was on the programme for nine numbers, which were admirably chosen to exhibit his own wide artistic range, and the capabilities of the Karn-Warren organ, which proved a brilliant success.

The recital was diversified by some excellent vocal music. The choir of 60 voices, under Mr. W. H. Hewlett, rendered Gounod's "Unfold, Ye Portals," with splendid effect. They were assisted by 25 girls representing the angelic choir, with a cornet obligato by Mr. Irwin. The unaccompanied chorus, "Come Unto Him" (Gounod) was an exquisite performance, showing perfect precision and balance. Miss Roblyn distinguished herself by charming solo, which was encored. The church quartet—Miss Roblyn, Miss Ruse. Mr. Skinner and Mr. Carrollgave the ever-welcome "Lead, Kindly

W. Karn & Co.'s factory at Woodstock are famous. Electricity-the marvelous agency by which science has produced countless wonders-has been harnessed in many amazing ways by the makers of this magnificent instrument. Built entirely on the electric system, it admits of many artistic contrivances not other wise possible, and thus, on the mutual ground where science and art merge, the highest attainment of each is happily combined. It was built under the superintendence of Mr. Charles S. Warren, the pioneer pipe organ builder, and contains many unique features, in improvements. Besides the three manuals, it has a large pedal organ, 37 speaking stops, 15 couplers, 8 electric combination pistons, crescendo pedal, stop switch, etc. Each manual is coupled to the other by unison, sub and super-octave couplers, capable of producing innumerable and entrancing solo effects. The delicate voicing of the lighter stops is especially fine, and the full tone of the organ is rich and powerful—a veritable flood of melody. To say that the organ is a credit to the house, Dr. McKay. makers is putting it mildly. They have achieved a notable success in its manu-

Nearly 30 years ago the firm of D. W. Karn & Co. began the manufacture of reed organs at Woodstock, and their being sold in all parts of the world. Some seven years ago they began the manufacture of the Karn pianos, both grand and upright, and the demand for them has been enormous. A few months ago they added a pipe organ department to their extensive plant, and in this line, as in the others, the aim of the firm is to make the best instruments that skill and workmanship can produce. Dundas Center Church people are to be congratulated upon the fine instrument.
