

TREPOFF IS DEAD; WAS WORST HATED MAN IN ALL RUSSIA

Enemy of the Revolutionary | The gravity of his illness was well-Part Succumbs to Heart Trouble.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 17. - General Dmitri Foedorovich Trepoff, commandant of the Imperial Palace, died of angina pectoris Saturday night in his matic troubles, and some time ago was as commandant of the palace, but remained in office and was still in touch with the Emperor.

Gen. Trepoff's death was due to natural causes; but the revolutionists can at least claim partial responsibility for his end, as his illness was superinduced by the constant strain due to perpetual fear of death, which, with lack of exercises and recreations during the last two years wore down an originally superb constitution.

Gen. Trepoff was at once the worst nacle by Elder Arrington, he advised villa at Peterhof. Gen.
