Patient Suicided at London Asylum Kippen Man Had Been Inmate a Year

And Put His Head Under Ice.

John Strong, of Kippen, an inmate of the London Insane Asylum, committed was discovered. suicide yesterday, just before noon, Coroner Maclaren was notified, but decided that an inquest was not necessary, walked into the water, and deliberately as no blame could be attached to any
