ny" or narrow folds. The bodice com-
bines chiffon and silver lace. On the chart-
reuse side are run several folds of
cloth of silver, and the extremely short
kimono sleeve is also finished with the
"bunny" of silver and green laid
beneath the bodice and just below the
girdle on the skirt shows the reflection
of this color. The skirt is a simple
one, with a few folds, carries several
folds. On this gown mauve and pale
orange are combined. A delicate
ruffle of chartreuse green chiffon be-
gins at the centre front and wraps itself
around the figure. These ruffles are
edged with green and silver. Silver

PAY TO PREVENT
RATHER TO CURE.
A Toronto organization is advocating
the better care of illegitimate children
by the state, and where possible the
tracing of the father and compelling
him to assist in the support of the
child. Statistics largely prove that such
children are not kept by the mothers,
who are usually too young and depend-
ent to provide for them, says this or-
ganization. Consequently, they are
placed out into homes, some of them
good and some of them far from satis-
factory, when it is a matter of pro-
viding necessary care for the children.
The state should undertake to see that
these children receive a proper education
in the matter which is showing itself upon
the public conscience of today.

Further, it is felt that the number
of these illegitimate children of the
world might be greatly lessened if
good, wholesome recreation were pro-
vided young girls, and clubs estab-
lished, where they might spend their
evenings in a home atmosphere. The Y. W.
C. A. is doing a great deal of this work
in this work of providing recrea-
tion, and a home for girls who need it.
They are coming to the rescue of these
girls for funds to carry on. Surely it is much
cheaper to pay the bills of prevention
than to pay the bills of a later rectify-
ing taxation rate, while the state under-
takes the burden of parenthood, which
should have been undertaken by
fathers and mothers.

To Make Pot Pourri.
Dear Miss Grey—I would like very
much to have someone in your column
tell me how to make "Pot Pourri." I
don't know what to put with them.

Ans.—Here are two methods: think
if I were making pot pourri I should
use the second one: 1. Take the dried
petals and put in a jar with alternate
layers of dry salt mixed with orris
powder, then stir the whole up and
moisten with rosewater. 2. Dried lav-
ender 1 lb., rose leaves 1 lb., crushed
citrus root 1/2 lb., broken cloves, cinna-
mon and allspice, each 2 ozs., table
salt 1 lb., mix the lavender and rose
leaves together and add the other in-
gredients to the salt. Place alternate
layers of the two mixtures into your
jar, and keep it closed tightly for sev-
