EX-SOLDIERS WISHING VOCATIONAL TRAINING, APPLY TO THE S. A. C.

Includes the Men who Took Course and Were Not Successful in Getting Jobs.

It was announced this morning by the secretary of the local branch of the ex-soldiers' aid commission that men who had not received vocational training should apply at once to him. This will take in all men who have either had a course and were not successful in getting work, and also men who were refused a course owing to technicalities in the regulations governing the training.

It is not known at present just how far the movement will go in regard to the training of men who have been refused a course, but any person who feels that he has been unjustly treated in the matter of vocational training should apply at once.

The head office of the S. A. C. has asked for reports to be submitted on each person applying to the training, so that facts regarding men who have been turned down may be learned.

Men who have started on their courses and have not completed them will also be eligible under the new system. Those who started and completed a course and then found that they could not carry on with the work either through disability or being unable to obtain work, may also apply for a new course.

COLLEGIATE FIRE PROBE OPENS AT CITY HALL TODAY

E. P. Heaton in Full Charge of Investigation.

E. P. Heaton, chief fire marshal of the province, arrived in the city today. He commenced an investigation of the collegiate fire at 2:30 this afternoon. E. D. Jordan, deputy fire marshal, has been in the city several days making preliminary arrangements. He made an examination of the building. Plans and photographs of the building before it was burned have been obtained and will be used this afternoon. L. E. Carrothers, architect for the city engineering staff, will be called to give information. Fire Chief Aitken will also be asked for information.

JUDGE CHOQUETTE'S OPINION. Quebec, April 29.—"If you appeared before a certain judge of your province, and being unable to speak the language of the majority of that province, you would be deemed worthy of deportation." Such were the remarks addressed by Justice Choquette this morning to a witness from Ontario, unable to utter a word of French. "But in this province, although regretting that everyone does not possess at least a certain knowledge of the two official languages, we give to each the opportunity of being heard and understood," concluded the judge.

WILLIAM J. HEASLIP WINS HIGH HONORS

Obtains Silver Medal of the National Academy of Design.

William J. Heaslip, formerly a commercial artist and engraver in the employ of Lawson & Jones, Limited, but who went to New York last September to continue his art studies, has been successful in obtaining the Suydam silver medal of the National Academy of Design.

Heaslip's design, which is a portrait of a man, was one of the best of the year. It was awarded him by the National Academy of Design, which is a traveling fellowship. Mr. Heaslip does not state whether he expects to win the fellowship next year, but he is confident that the winning of the medal was quite beyond his brightest expectations.

Another London artist, Albert Temple, at the same New York school, has also won a silver medal in the examinations.

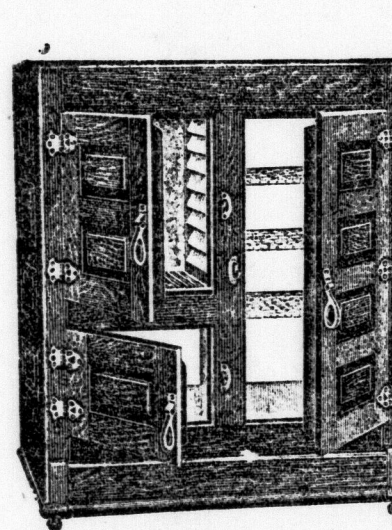
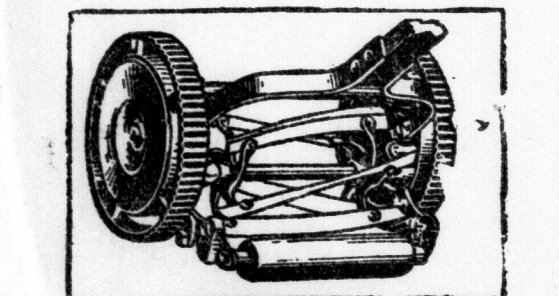

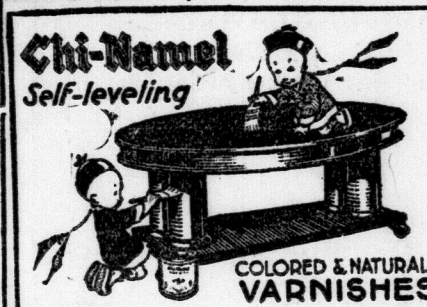

139 YOUTHFUL CITIZENS ADDED TO POPULATION DURING APRIL

Thirty More Than in April, 1919—Fewer Deaths Registered.

Thirty more babies arrived in London this month than during April, 1919. Boy babies numbered 75, and girl babies 66, a total of 141. In April, 1919, 14 boys babies and 28 girl babies were born, a total of only 42. Fewer deaths occurred this month than in the corresponding month of 1919. The total for April this year was 72, while in April, 1919, it was 78. Thirty-four male and 38 female citizens died this month, and 29 male and 20 female persons died in the same month last year.

A total of 56 marriages was reported this month. Exactly the same number were recorded in April last year.

Throughout the summer members of the recreation club will devote themselves to the promoting of sports. Extensive preparations are being made.

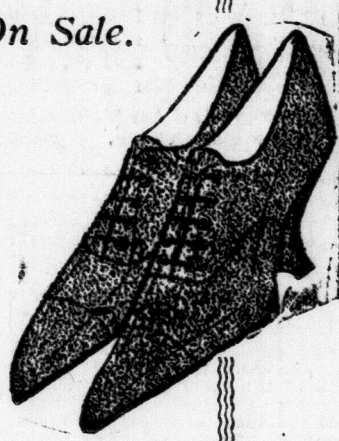

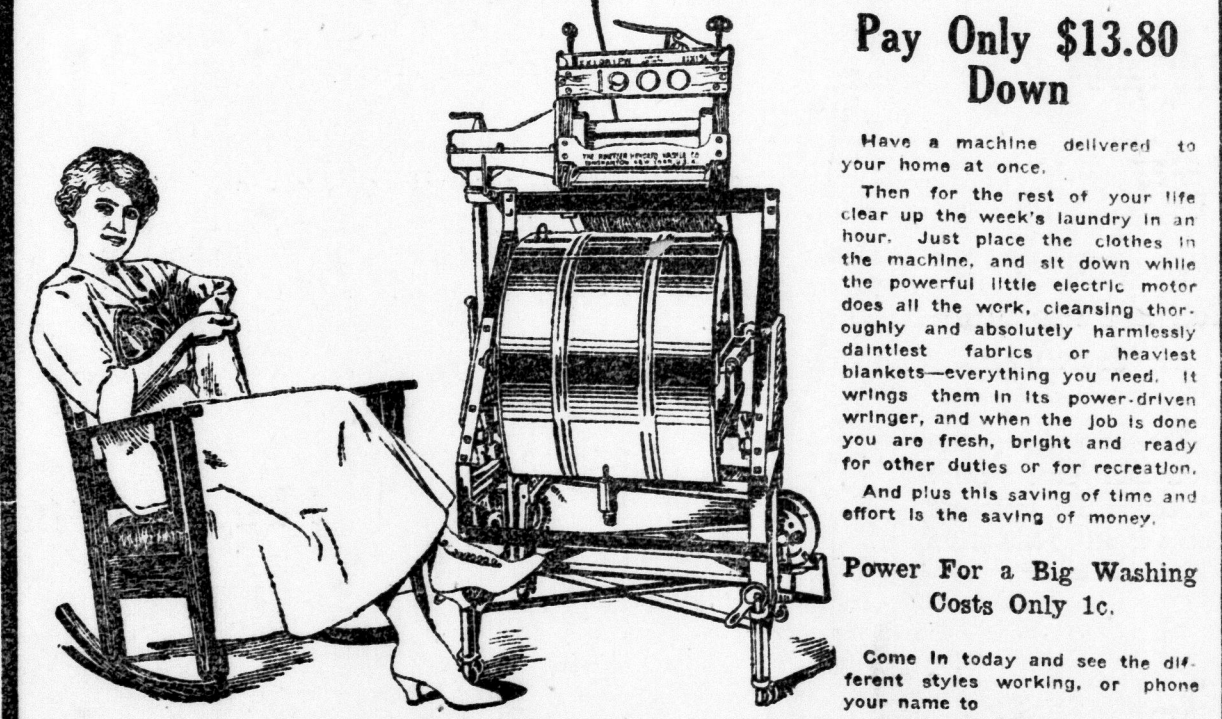
