

#### **GRAND TRUNK LINE** SEEKS PAYMENT II U. S. SUPREME COURT

Takes Action Against Secretary of Treasury For Half

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—Mandamus proceedings against the secretary of the treasury were instituted today in the District of Columbia supreme court by the Grand Trunk Western Railway Company to require payment of an inter-state commerce commission certificate calling for \$500,000 as due the road under the guaranty provisions of the transportation act. The court issued an order returnable December 7, requiring Secretary Houston to show requiring Secretary Houston to show cause why the writ should not be granted.

While the Grand Trunk Company is the only petitioner in the case, approximately \$400,000,000 claimed by the railroads is involved in the litigation, according to a statement issued tonight.

according to a statement issued tonight by the Association of Railway

according to a statement issued tonight by the Association of Railway Executives.

The proceedings grew out of an opinion rendered October 7 by the comptroller of the treasury, based upon certain certificates presented by the inter-state commence commission, to the treasury department in favor of the Grand Trunk Western Railway Company and the Detroit, Grand Haven and Milwaukee Railroad, in which opinion the comptroller of the treasury held that partial payments could not be made by the secretary of the treasury to a carrier in advance of final settlement with the roads in winding up the government guarantees in connection with public administration of the systems.

The comptroller took the position that the inter-state commerce commission was empowered to issue only one certificate to each carrier, this being for the full amount of final settlement.


