WILL REBEL LAST WHOLE LENGTH OF LONDON RAILWAY

Sir Adam Beck Re-elected Chairman of the London Railway Commission—Philip Pocock Vice-President—New Engine, Steam Shovel and Cars Absolute Necessity.

That the London and Port Stanley railway will be re-elected through out its entire length this year was announced by General Manager Richards at the inaugural meeting of the London railway commission, which was held in the P. U. C. board room this morning.

The first business of the commission was the appointment of a chairman, and, although Sir Adam Beck was re-elected to the position, Philip Pocock was also re-elected as vice-chairman in the absence of Sir Adam.

The other members of the commission are Mayor Little and Aldermen John Bridge and Cameron Wilson, direct representatives of the city council.

TWO MEN HELD BY POLICE ON VAGRANCY CHARGE IN CONNECTION WITH THE WOODSTOCK HOLD-UP

Norman Garfield and His Brother Denton Remanded to Jail for Week by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon—Wife of One Man Well Known to Police.

In order that witnesses might be secured to try to identify the two men as those who had been robbing Western Ontario stores, the two men were taken to the Woodstock police station, where they were held on a charge of vagrancy by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon.

The two men, Kitle Garfield, who is unknown to the police, and Annie Garfield, well known to the police, were also remanded for a week.

These four were arrested at an apartment in house No. 54 on Dundas street by Sergeant of Detectives Robert Eggleston, Harry Down and Thomas Bolton, and two police constables, at 11 o'clock last night.

According to the police they were closely connected with the Woodstock hold-up, and the police are anxious to identify the men as those who were involved in the hold-up.

When asked to give an account of himself this morning, Norman Garfield said that he had been working at Neilson's, Toronto, but when he was laid off came to London to visit his brother Denton. He had not been working for some time.

Early this morning police officers wishing to have a look at the suspects. It was necessary to put P. C. William Burgess at the entrance to the court to prevent all those not having business there from entering.

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WROTE LETTERS TO HIS CONSTITUENTS ON WRAPPING PAPER

Local Alderman Tells How He Defeated His Opponents.

USED LEAD PENCIL

Won Support of Working Men and Women of London.

Getting elected to the London City Council is an art not to be despised if one can believe the revelations which an alderman, in a weak moment, made to a group of more or less confidential friends in an office not far distant from Dundas and Wellington streets.

BEATRICE, LANGUISHING IN JAIL, SMOKES CIGARETTES, DRINKS TEA AND LONGS FOR MAMA SHE LOVES

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 22.—Miss Beatrice Hebert, the 29-year-old girl, who was arrested in Montreal for forcing her attentions on William Zinner, assistant manager of a tourist agency here, continues to pine for her "Will" between continuous puffs of cigarettes and drinking in her cell. No word has been received at Washington concerning deportation papers for her return to Montreal.

According to records at the Philadelphia Hospital, where the love-sick woman was detained last September, when she was previously arrested for annoying Zinner, she is the victim of a mental ailment. Physicians who examined her say she is perfectly normal on all subjects, save Zinner.

As proof of this, they assert she shows evidence of a careful education, speaking and writing German, Spanish and French, in addition to being an expert stenographer. She also discusses the League of Nations and the Irish question in an intelligent manner. In the language of physicians, when talking of Zinner, she is just silly.

Unless a request is received from the immigration bureau she will be kept in the Philadelphia Hospital, instead of being sent to a hospital, as physicians say, while awaiting deportation papers from Washington. They fear Beatrice will make a break for liberty.

JAPAN'S GRIP IN VLADIVOSTOK IS TIGHT AS EVER

All U. S. Mail Rigidly Censored—American Exporters Are Forced to Pay High Duties.

ERECT HUGE WIRELESS

10,000 Troops Stationed in City to Cinch Grip and Awe Inhabitants.

Honolulu, Jan. 22.—Since the Japanese seized Vladivostok, the city has been ruled with a heavy hand. American business and personal mail, outgoing and incoming, is censored by the Japanese, who compel the Russian postal officials to permit them to share a large room in which the Russians censor mail.

All mail is opened and always delayed. The security of the country is even taken to the trouble to close the envelopes with stickers. Americans are forced to furnish full translations with all cable messages.

Advocates Maintaining of Friendship With U. S., But Insists On Rights in the California Question Being Observed—Indorses League of Nations and Renewal of Anglo-Jap Alliance.

Tokio, Jan. 22.—Immediate evacuation of Siberia, universal suffrage and insistence upon Japanese rights in the California question were demanded in resolutions passed today at a general meeting of the Japanese Diet, the upper house of the Japanese parliament.

The Diet, which is in session in Tokyo, passed resolutions demanding that the Japanese government should insist upon its rights in the California question, and should also insist upon its rights in the League of Nations and the renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

NEW NURSES' HOME IS PLANNED FOR THE ONTARIO HOSPITAL

Work Will Start Soon As the Appropriation Passed.

SAYS CIVILIANS MURDERED.

London, Jan. 21.—During the first fifteen days of this year, says a bulletin just issued by the Sinn Fein, "the armed forces of the English Government have achieved the following success: Fourteen civilians murdered, including seven women; six towns shot; forty houses and eleven shops wholly or partially destroyed; seven men tortured or killed; and one crematorium, one factory and two public halls destroyed."

SOVIET 'AMBASSADOR' ON HIS WAY HOME

Ludwig C. A. K. Martens Is Deported by the U. S. Authorities.

New York, Jan. 22.—Nearly two years of effort by Ludwig C. A. K. Martens to gain recognition by the United States Government as the ambassador of the Russian Soviet Government ended today with his deportation from the United States.

Martens, who was known as the "Red Ambassador," was deported by the U. S. authorities on the grounds that he was not a citizen of the United States and that he was engaged in subversive activities.

NEW GIANT CAVE HOLDS BONES OF PREHISTORIC MAN

Lexington, Ky., Jan. 21.—New caverns, whose presence has never been suspected, one of which contained the skeleton of a prehistoric human being, have been found in the Great Crystal Cavern of Hart County.

The cavern, which is situated in the mountains of Kentucky, is one of the largest and best preserved in the world. It contains the bones of a prehistoric man, which were found by a local hunter.

CAUGHT A WIFE IN STEEL TRAP

Laurel, Miss., Jan. 22.—Driven from his cabin in the swampy along Leaf River by high water, Albert Parsons, an aged white man and his wife were brought to Laurel today and placed in the county poorhouse. The finding of Parsons is believed to set at rest the reports of a "wild man" current for years, said to be living in this section.

BARGE COLLAPSES. DRAGS TUG DOWN TOO

New York, Jan. 21.—The tug boat Phoenix, of the Goodwin-Gallagher Company, and a barge of sand, which she was towing, were lost today when the barge collapsed, pulling the tug down with her. Eight men on the tug and one on the barge were rescued by the tug Terrier, which was near by.

KING'S PRINTER NOW LIBRARIAN OF HOUSE

Toronto, Jan. 21.—A. T. Wilgess, King's printer, has been appointed legislative librarian by the Ontario Government, in succession to A. Farde. Major Clarkson W. J. Grant, minister of education, will be the new King's printer.

TRUSTEE ROWE MISINFORMED ON SOME POINTS, SAYS MRS. GEMMELL

BRITISH SUBMARINE WITH ENTIRE CREW IS LOST AT ENTRANCE TO CHANNEL

Undersea Craft K-5 Was in Command of John A. Gaines—Fifty Men and Six Officers Go Down With the Vessel—Belonged to Type Known as "Fleet" Submarines, Which Were Used for Cruising With Big Squadrons.

London, Jan. 22.—British submarine K-5, commander John A. Gaines, was lost with all the crew aboard on Thursday at the approaches to the English Channel, the admiralty announced this afternoon.

The complement of the lost submarine was not given, but vessels of this class carry approximately six officers and 50 men. The disaster, the admiralty announcement states, occurred 100 miles off Land's End. The submarine, it is added, had a full complement of officers and men on board.

The cause of the disaster is not known.

BUTCHER SHOPS, TOO BAKESHOPS, HOTEL KITCHENS AND GROCERY STORES ALSO LOOKED AFTER.

That a persistent effort is being made to keep local restaurants in first-class condition is indicated by the monthly reports of R. S. Sanders, sanitary inspector, which has just been submitted to the board of health. He states that he has visited 100 restaurants in the last month, and found them all much improved. Two or three owners have spent considerable money in getting up-to-date appliances. Most of the restaurants were found to be in good condition.

London Ministers Do Not Agree With Toronto Divine.
